Course Description:

The purpose of applied lessons is to develop a well-rounded musician in the area of percussion. This includes technical development, development of musical expression and interpretation, pedagogical considerations, sight-reading, and stylistic considerations. Additional areas explored could include instrument construction and maintenance, composing and arranging, and repertoire analysis. This will be accomplished through the in-depth study of keyboard percussion instruments, snare drum, timpani, drum set, and excerpts.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate the following learning outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate proficiency on a variety of instruments through the study of etudes, solos, and orchestral literature
- 2. Enhance reading at sight on a variety of percussion instruments
- 3. Analyze, interpret, and discuss a variety of percussion topics
- 4. Develop sound pedagogical ideas and principles for effective teaching
- 5. Develop goal setting and planning skills through application
- 6. Establish a professional portfolio

Required Course Materials:

- 1. All sticks/mallets required to perform assigned pieces
- 2. All printed music, assigned repertoire/etudes
- 3. Pencil
- 4. Metronome
- 5. Recording device

Lesson Expectations:

Lessons will take place in FAC2220, the percussion practice module, or FAC2007. Lessons will last 55 minutes. Missed lessons will be made-up if the lesson was missed at the fault of the instructor, or the lesson was an excused absence. Students are expected to practice 2 hours a day. During our first lesson we will devise a plan for you to be successful with the below curriculum. Each semester, you will pick 2 instruments to study. During that semester, you will work to pass off the required materials. The goal is to pass off all materials by the end of your third year. Transfer students will perform an abbreviated curriculum as deemed beneficial. The last year or two will be focused on preparing for your recital and future career. Students are expected to be prepared to start their lesson at their assigned time. Depending on material, you may need to arrive early to set up instruments. All material assigned from the previous week may be covered in each lesson. Sight reading will be performed in each lesson as well. All students have the option to record their lesson.

Preparation and Practice:

Students are expected to practice a minimum of two hours per day with one day off per week. As a student you should schedule your practice sessions as part of your regular schedule and be consistent. You will progress more quickly if you are organized with meaningful and measurable goals in your practice routine.

Studio:

Every week, we will meet as a studio and discuss topics not covered in regular lessons. During this time, students may perform for each other, rehearse in groups, or work to maintain percussion equipment. Attendance at studio times will be considered part of the lesson grade for the semester. Studio time will take place at 12:30 pm on Thursdays.

Recital:

Recital repertoire must be approved by Professor Hastings. The material will consist of literature at an appropriate level for a senior undergraduate percussionist. You must perform on Marimba, Timpani, and snare drum or multi-percussion. You may also choose to perform on vibraphone and/or drum set. One piece must be an ensemble selection.

Materials:

Aside from method books and sheet music, you should collect an assortment of mallets and instruments. You must have a pair of drum set sticks, concert snare sticks, bell mallets, xylophone mallets, a set of four marimba mallets, a set of four vibraphone mallets, a medium pair of timpani mallets, and a staccato pair of timpani mallets. You may want to collect many more pairs of mallets than this to expand your articulation and color palette. If you plan to gig, you will need to acquire your own instruments such as a drum set, concert snare drum, and a tambourine.

Attendance Policy:

Attendance at every lesson is expected. Each student will receive 14 individual applied lessons throughout the semester. 24-hour notice is required if you have to miss your lesson as part of a non-emergency excused absence. If you must be absent, you will be considered excused for the following reasons: Illness, death in the family, or an approved, university sponsored event. The exception to the 24-hour notification would be in the case of an emergency. Any other reasons will be considered an unexcused absence. Each unexcused absence will result in the reduction of your final grade in the course. Three or more unexcused absences will result in an automatic F in the course. Failing to attend a jury at the end of the semester will result in a failing grade.

<u>Curriculum:</u> Excerpts and Vibraphone will be last. Mallets, Snare, and Timpani must be completed before the upper division barrier.

Upper Division Barrier

The upper division barrier will consist of the 40 PAS rudiments. Choice of one Delecluse or Tompkins etude. Demonstration of an F Major scale on the 26" and 29" timpani. Permutations in all keys, and an excerpt from a four mallet-solo.

Transfer Student Audition

Transfer students will be expected to meet upper division standards to be enrolled in junior-level lessons. Transfer students should be prepared with the PAS 40 rudiments, a snare solo comparable to Delecluse or Tompkins, an F Major scale between the 29" and 26" timpani, and a four-mallet solo at an appropriate level to enter as an upper division percussionist. Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services

Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average.

Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance.
