This course takes a panoramic view of religion and politics, focusing on several historical periods and world regions. More than an emphasis on theologies or beliefs, we will examine religious organizations and how they interact with state structures. This course explores the role religion plays in politics and its implication for civil life. As such, the more appropriate title for the course might be "Church & State in World History," with "church" being a generic simplifying term that includes a synagogue, mosque, temple, etc.

Our goal is to understand how various religious institutions, actors and values affect political behavior, and, conversely, how the political actors and institutions affect religious practice. This course will also take a "rational choice" perspective to the study of religion, religious institutions, politics, and governments. The emphasis will be on how humans interact with the incentive structures in their environment.

American Gospel and Kings of Buddhism Assignments: Students must carefully read and write a short essay on each chapter of each book. Students will write six short (300-500 words) essays for *American Gospel* and eight essays for *Kings of Buddhism*.

Examinations: There will be two examinations in this course. The midterm and final examinations will be drawn from required readings, videos, and in-class discussions. You must be in class to answer questions about our in-class discussions.
