Communications: I encourage you to visit office hours or directly after class via zoom. This is a good opportunity for you to look over your exams, ask questions, or seek clarification. If you cannot attend my office hours you may set-up an alternative time. I will respond to your emails within 24 hours on weekdays and 48 hours on weekends. In your email, include your first and last name and that you are enrolled in Geography 4665.

All of us, including myself, will need to be **flexible** this semester because of the coronavirus. If you are sick and cannot attend a class that is okay. All I ask, is that you communicate with me. If I get sick with Covid, you will be notified by email and I will send you a contingency plan. I understand that some students will be using their computers at home or in non-traditional locations with more distractions than an in-person class. If this happens (i.e. parent walks in, animal jumps on lap, or kid will not let you work, bad internet connection) do not be embarrassed or worried. I understand. Everyone is having to adjust to new ways of learning and working right now. I too will have distractions when I am teaching, especially from home.

Required texts:

- 1. Placing Latin America, 3rd edition. Edited by Edward L. Jackiewicz and Fernando J. Bosco. Rowman and Littlefield. This book is available online at the UT Tyler library. Only three students can use this book at one time. However, you can download and save sections of the book.
- 2. A Beauty That Hurts: Life and Death in Guatemala, 2nd edition. Author: W. George Lovell. University of Texas Press.

Catalogue description: Studies in geography to include such topics as historical geography, economic geography, and cultural geography. May be repeated once for credit when topic varies.

Course learning objectives: The objectives of the course are:

- (1) Apply geographic terms to Latin America and Caribbean regions.
- (2) Differentiate the physical and cultural geography of Latin America and the Caribbean.
- (3) Demonstrate how the regions are integrated.
- (4) Evaluate historical and contemporary issues.
- (5) Consider the variable urban, political, economic, physical, and cultural geographic issues.

Course format: Class lectures and discussions will be supplemented by the required text, assigned readings, current events, videos, demonstrations, and guest lectures. Lectures and readings will not necessarily cover the same ground. Indeed, they are intended to supplement each other rather than to completely overlap. Starting on January 27th, all

students must participate in the class discussions. You will be graded based on your participation. I strongly recommend that you attend every lecture and carefully study the assigned readings. I encourage relevant questions and comments during the lecture. A question you have other students might also have, and thoughtful remarks will make the course more interesting for everyone, including myself.

Class Etiquette: I expect everyone in the classroom to be **respectful** of each other and treat everyone with dignity – each of us brings different opinions and experiences some of these might be dissimilar to your own. I expect comments to be positive and objective and not judgmental and rude.

Grading: The course grade will be based on two exams (mid-term and final), one group discussion lead, participation (attendance and discussion), a domesticated food assignment, and a research project (proposal, paper, and presentation).

Exams: The exams will cover material from class including slides, discussions, presentations, guest lectures, readings, and videos. The midterm will cover material from the first part of the course; the final will cover material from the second part of the course including the presentations. Exams will be taken online and could include multiple choice, true/false short answer, and essay questions dealing with major issues raised in the course.

Group Discussion Lead: Each student will be required to participate in a group to lead the class in a discussion about the assigned readings. I will announce and post a sign-up sheet during the second week of class. In order to facilitate the discussion, each group will be required to turn in at least 8 questions and/or comments over the readings in order to facilitate the discussions. Specific instructions will be posted on the class Canvas site. See the attached schedule for discussion dates.

Research Proposal, Paper, and Presentation: Each student will research, write, and present a 8-10 page paper over a current issue in Latin America. You can find topics by reading the newspaper, listening to NPR, visiting the CIA World Factbook site, the class Canvas home page rss feed, or a list of topics given to you by your instructor. Detailed instructions will be posted on the class Canvas site. See the attached schedule for the due date.

Class Discussion Participation and Attendance: Students are expected to complete the readings for each class period and to participate in class discussions about the readings. Every student is expected to turn in at least three questions and/or comments at the beginning Discussion Sessions 1-4 (see the schedule for dates). These questions should be typed. Your participation grade will be partially based on these discussion sessions. If you need help with this component, please ask me for further details. I will not accept late discussion questions and comments.

Make-up Policy: Make-up tests will be given with a legitimate reason and in rare circumstances. Students should contact the instructor **prior** to the exam and not after if they will miss the exam. Make-up exams will not be given except when there are exceptional circumstances (be prepared to provide documentation of your circumstance, such as a doctor's note, police report, University-excused absence, *et cetera*). Ten points will deducted each day for late projects.

Incidence of Scholastic Dishonesty: You will receive an automatic zero on the assignment. All cases of plagiarism or cheating will result in an automatic zero for the assignment.
