Weighted Final Grade Calculations

- 1. Homework, Quizzes, and assigned activities 20% of semester grade.
- 2. Midterm exam 30% of semester grade (or dropped if lower than the final exam)
- 3. Final exam (covers entire course) counts 50% (or 80% of semester grade if final exam is higher than the Midterm exam in which case the midterm exam is dropped and the final exam is weighted 80%).

*Notes: Details of calculations with examples are presented elsewhere.

- Midterm and final exams will/may be objective-type exams (multiple choice, true or false, short answer, problem solving), essay, or a combination. Prepare for all types of questions. These exams may or may not require administration in a "live" setting which may require an exam proctor.
- Content of midterm exam will be limited to material covered between the date of the exam and the start of the semester. The final exam will be cumulative covering the entire semester. Since your learning can best be determined by your performance at the end of the semester.
- Quizzes and assignments will be administered on a regular basis.

Evaluation:

Self-assessment Quizzes: These consist of short, timed questions about the reading material, assignments, and vocabulary. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped. A missed quiz or unsubmitted quiz will be counted as one of the lowest grades to be dropped. (If you are working from an unstable computer it is your responsibility to locate a stable computer on which to take quizzes when they are posted online) NO LATE QUIZZES ACCEPTED.

Homework and Assignments: These are designed to reinforce learning and/or to give students an opportunity to stay regularly engaged in reading while developing a professional vocabulary. Homework assignments are to be the student's own work, and due on the assigned due date. NO LATE WORK IS ACCEPTED

Midterm Exam: this exam will be comprised of questions base on material from class activities, readings, internet activities, quizzes and homework assignments completed during the didactic portion of the course

Final Exam: cumulative over the semester. The final exam is similar in form and question type (objective questions) as the midterm exam.

Textbook Lectures, Selected Topics & CANVAS:

This course was designed around reading assignments in your textbook [primarily] as the "backbone" of its structure. Reading material will often relate to a corresponding CANVAS activity but sometimes it will not. Because topical material other than "textbook" topics may be presented, it is your responsibility to compile your own study notes. Assigned reading material, special topic lecture material and CANVAS provided material are part of your learning environment. It is important to your success that you be consistently engaged in all aspects of these course components.

Engagement:

A record of course activity and access will be maintained. There will be NO MAKEUPS of quizzes, assignments or major exams. No "extra credit" is available in this course.

REMEMBER: This is a seven-week course so it may appear to be more time demanding than a full fourteen-week course. It is critical that you keep up and manage your study time effectively.
