COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course serves as the capstone for all students pursuing a B.A. in Art with a concentration in Art History. Students will select a thesis topic in consultation with an art history faculty advisor, who will supervise the thesis.

COURSE OVERVIEW

Over the course of the semester the student is expected to complete a final 15-page thesis with images, footnotes, and bibliography. Once the final thesis has faculty approval, students then edit the thesis down to 10 pages for a public thesis presentation, accompanied by a PowerPoint. The quality expected of the paper and presentation is the highest level and should demonstrate a strong proficiency in art historical methodologies of research, interpretation, and oral communication.

BA STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Historical Identification: Students will be able to identify historical periods and stylistic development of significant artworks from the canon of historical periods customary in Western or Non-Western traditions.
- **Interpretation of Artworks:** Students will be able to interpret works of art from formal or conceptual perspectives.
- Analysis Using Art Historical Theory: Students will be able to apply art historical theory to an analysis of works of art.
- **Synthesize Knowledge:** Students will be able to synthesize knowledge to incorporate different perspectives into their scholarship.

• **Scholarly Research Methods:** Students will be able to conduct basic scholarly research utilizing standards and methods of the discipline.

REQUIRED TEXTS

Course texts will be determined by the bibliography created by student and approved by the faculty.

FINAL GRADE

The faculty supervisor determines the final grade based upon the quality of the final thesis (60%), presentation (30%) and whether the student turns in drafts, thesis, and presentation on time as scheduled (10%).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. The course requires the student to create a calendar to meet with the supervisor and turn in all required drafts, final papers, and presentation on time.
- 2. The course requires that the student write a 15-page thesis paper with footnotes, bibliography and labeled images. Use of primary sources is encouraged.
- 3. The student will edit the 15-page thesis to 10 pages to read at an oral presentation.
- 4. Student will create a PowerPoint to show in conjunction with the reading of the 10-page paper at a semester end presentation.
- 5. The course is 1 hour of undergraduate credit. Successful completion is required for graduation with the B.A. in Art with a concentration in Art History.

COURSE POLICIES

<u>Submission of Work:</u> All written assignments will be turned in on Canvas.

<u>Late Work Policy:</u> If drafts and/or completed thesis is not turned in on time students may not pass the course and not graduate.

It is unacceptable to copy something out of a book, newspaper, journal, Internet site or any printed source without citing your source. The most blatant example of this is directly copying something word for word. It does not matter if it is only a phrase. If it is not yours, you must either not use it or place it in quotes and reference it.

If you paraphrase another person's words or ideas, you still must cite them as a source. Do not put a paraphrase in quotes, but be sure to give the author's name, the text, and the page where you found the idea. For citing sources use
