Course Overview and Objectives:

In our focus on Renaissance Europe, we will be giving particular attention to trans-global contacts between Europeans and peoples in the Americas, Africa and South Asia. Going beyond the familiar theme of European conquest/colonization, we will explore how cultural interaction was expressed through such categories as ethnography, cartography, ecology and economics. This graduate readings course is aimed at improving students' ability to interpret recent and classic historiography, thereby enhancing their analytical and writing skills.

Course Requirements and Grading Policy:

Your grade will be based mainly on written reviews of the books we are reading. Each paper is worth 10% of your total grade (six reviews totaling 60%), a comprehensive essay will be worth 30% and finally 10% for attendance and participation. Papers should be roughly 4-6 pages in length and should address the book's thesis and how well it proves its case. The comprehensive essay will be a retrospective comparison of all six books. Late papers will not be accepted unless there is official documentation of a family or medical emergency.
