### **Course Overview and Learning Outcomes:**

This course is an upper-level survey of Europe in the Renaissance. We will examine the period from roughly 1300 to the early 1500s focusing on political, economic and social considerations along with a study of humanism and statecraft. No prior knowledge of the period is required. The only prerequisite is an interest in the topic.

### **Course Requirements:**

The course will consist of lectures and discussions; regular attendance is essential. There will be a midterm exam, a final exam and a term paper (approx. 6-8 pages). Each of these will be worth 1/3 of your course grade. The exams will consist of choices of terms from our lecture outlines (5 out of 10 for a total of 50% of the exam grade) and an essay (choice of 1 out of 2 for the remaining 50% of the exam grade). The term paper will be based on your analysis of the works by Machiavelli and Erasmus. Further instructions for the paper will be given separately.

### **Grading Policy:**

Each assignment is worth 100 points for a course total of 300 points. The grading scale is
