Course Description:

This course explores the Second World War and the Holocaust in Germany through readings, discussion, lectures, and a trip to Germany. We will tour major and minor historic sites, monuments, and cultural sites on a range of topics regarding the conflict and its consequences. Travel and tours will be contextualized with readings and discussions to gain a strong understanding and appreciation for the course and consequences of the Second World War and the Holocaust in Germany and Europe as a whole.

Content Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Demonstrate a strong understanding of the causes, course, and consequences of the Second World War and the Holocaust in Europe generally and Germany specifically.
2. Think critically and objectively about the Second World War and the Holocaust in Europe and Germany role in the broader course of the global conflict.
3. Develop analytical skills through thinking, speaking, touring, and writing about history and the Second World War and Holocaust.

Assignments:

- Travel Experience (50 pts)
 - o In 500+ words, please write an essay that discusses your 1) previous travel experience, 2) why you think travel is important for humans generally and scholars specifically, and 3) what you hope to gain from this study abroad experience.
- Book Synopses (2 x 50 = 100 pts)
 - o Please write two 600+ word synopses of what you gained from the first and second halves of Nicholas Stargardt's *The German War*.
 - Synopsis 1: pp. 1-232
 - Synopsis 2: pp. 233-570
- Travel Journal (100 pts)
 - o Students will keep a daily journal while we're in Germany. By the end of each day, please write 250+ words in which you consider the following: 1) What did you learn about the history of Germany that day—WWII or otherwise? 2) What did you learn about German culture that day? 3) Reflect on your personal experience that day—surprises, struggles, etc.
- Attendance and Active Participation (200 pts)
 - o Attend and actively participate in all course related events in Texas and in Germany. Failure to do so (without instructor consent) will result in a zero on the attendance/participation grade.
- Video Presentation (50 pts)
 - o In a 5-7 minute video made after we return, please share your experience in Germany using the following questions as your guide: 1) What did you learn about the history of Germany? 2) What did you learn about German culture? 3) How did visiting Germany impact you? Please use pictures that you took throughout the presentation.
- *Grad Students Only--All the above plus:
 - o ~10-minute presentation to the class **while in Germany**.
 - Based on primary source material and situated within relevant secondary scholarship.
 - One-page synopsis and full bibliography to be turned-in to instructor.

Attendance, Participation, and Decorum:

This is an upper-level university course. Attendance and participation are mandatory. Considering the nature of this travel class, it is imperative that you show up on time² for all meetings, tours, and any other class-wide event. *All* students must attend *all* class events. Failure to do so without instructor consent will result in a zero on the participation grade.
