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Course Overview

This course will help students acquire the knowledge and skills for preparing competitive funding proposals for submission to private and public sponsors. Students will have opportunities to practice preparing, reviewing, and editing program plans and proposals. They will also gain knowledge on finding sources of external funds to support a program or research project. Students will apply their skills through a progressive writing project in which they will identify a need, develop a program plan, or research project that addresses the need, and write an effective proposal to a potential sponsor that they have identified.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students completing the course will be able to:

- Effectively plan a program or research project by examining the problem, determining what is needed to address the problem, and deciding how to produce the desired result or change.
- Locate available funding opportunities, find important information on funding opportunities, and determine if a funding opportunity is suitable for a proposed program or research project.
- Understand the fundamental components of a grant proposal such as the summary, need statement, outcomes, methods, evaluation, and budget.
- Use a logic model to organize a funding proposal.
- Develop, review, and edit competitive grant proposals.

Assignments

The course assignments and exams focus on helping students developing skills in planning programs and writing and editing proposals. I expect the writing assignments to indicate an understanding of material presented in reading assignments and classroom discussions. The

course's major assignment is a funding proposal that demonstrates knowledge and skills in program planning and proposal writing. Students can earn up to a total of 1200 points by reading the required materials, participating in classroom discussions, submitting assignments on time, and writing a competitive grant proposal.
