FREN 1611: Intensive French I (Online) Fall 2024

Course Description

Designed for students having no exposure to French, this course is equivalent to the first two Beginning French semester courses and offers 6 credit hours upon successful completion. It introduces both the French language and the world cultures and societies where French is spoken. Reading, writing, listening, and

speaking are emphasized with a focus on target-language comprehension and production.

Course Structure

This course takes place 100% online in Canvas. It is a 16-week course structure with 7 Unit Modules. Each module has multiple lessons with assignments due.

Expected Outcomes

By the end of the course, students should understand the main ideas of what they hear, see, and read in French. They should also be able to interact successfully on a basic level in both oral and written contexts. In addition to these linguistic skills, students should have a deeper understanding of the diverse aspects of societies and

cultures in francophone areas of the world.

Upon successful completion of this course, learners should be able to accomplish a variety of communicative

tasks, including:

Reading: Understand short, simple texts containing common language including mostly known and some

unknown vocabulary and structures.

Writing: Produce written messages of connected sentences and short paragraphs in order to request and

provide information related to everyday interactions.

<u>Listening</u>: Navigate familiar and unfamiliar language to comprehend the main ideas of everyday language. Understand requests and responses to requests to provide information.

<u>Interpersonal Speaking</u>: Negotiate meaning with other speakers to exchange information and some opinions on familiar topics.

<u>Presentational Speaking</u>: Provide organized responses at the sentence and short paragraph level to describe and express opinions about familiar topics.

Materials

The same textbook will be used for FREN 1611 and 2611.

Required textbook: Horizons. 7th edition, 2019, Cengage. (E-Book and MindTap digital learning platform)

- MindTap comes with a digital copy of the new textbook (e-book). The eBook and the Digital learning platform workbook – MindTap – are required. The textbook (hard copy or rented loose-leaf copy) is optional.
- If you buy a textbook (new or used), it is your responsibility to ensure you have access to MindTap.
- Please make sure to purchase the correct textbook.

This textbook and MindTap digital learning platform will be used for French 1611 and 2611. French 1611 covers Chapitre Préliminaire – 6; French 2611 covers chapters 7-10.

Technology requirements

This course has digital components. To fully participate in this class, students need internet access to reference content on the Canvas Learning Management System and software such as a webcam and microphone. Students will be informed of other technical needs to access course content if circumstances change.

MindTap Assignments: Students will be required to complete short assignments via MindTap (Cengage). Learning a foreign language requires constant practice. I recommend that students complete one or two MindTap assignments daily. I will assign an average of 15 MindTap assignments every two weeks (for each module). Each assignment can take about 5 to 10 minutes to complete. MindTap will guide students through the material and position them to make the most of the instruction and interactions in the same fashion as during class meetings.

Discussion Forums: Students will be required to watch videos, read short paragraphs from our textbook related to world cultures and societies where French is spoken, and answer questions. After their initial response, students will engage in the discussion by asking questions or adding comments to their classmates' posts. The discussion is in English, using complete sentences with substantive contributions and accurate information. The discussion assignments are designed to keep students connected.

Reading Comprehension: Reading plays a critical role in learning a foreign language. Throughout the semester, students will be asked to read authentic documents in French and answer questions adapted to the curriculum level. An online dictionary will be provided, and the assignment is, for the most part, a multiple-choice in English.

Chapter Review: At the end of each chapter/module, students will complete a chapter review, a multiple-choice assignment covering the chapter's grammar and vocabulary points. There are unlimited attempts and no time limit. A good strategy is to answer the questions at least once before looking at notes or the textbook; then, they can go back through and use notes and the textbook for help.

Module quizzes: Each module/chapter will have four or five quizzes based on listening comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, and writing. Students must complete the chapter reviews before starting the module quizzes. It is a timed assignment, and there is only one attempt for each quiz. Students Should be well prepared before starting.

Writing Compositions: Students will write short paragraphs, which will be included in their MindTap assignments. Google Translate and similar services are not permitted.

Recording: Students will turn in all their recordings on Canvas. Students must have a computer with a camera. The recording is submitted using Media Recording, which is directly recorded in Canvas with the camera on. A recording submitted without a camera will result in a grade of zero. The recordings will help students with their pronunciation and allow me to provide constructive feedback.

Oral Presentation: Two times this semester, students will record themselves speaking a few minutes about a specific topic in French. Students should speak at a normal speed and try to use a smooth, conversational tone. Students should make eye contact with the audience (look at their camera) and avoid reading off notes. Students must use complete sentences and demonstrate the correct use of conjugation tenses and vocabulary learned.

Pre-Exam Assessment (PEA): PEA 1 is a combined review from Modules 1 to 4, and PEA 2 is from Modules 5 to 7. The pre-exam assessments will allow students to review and prepare for the midterm and final exams. The format is similar to the actual exams, with two attempts.

Midterm Exam: The midterm exam covers chapters 0-3 and consists of five parts. Students are not required to complete all five parts in one sitting. However, once a section is open, they cannot leave the page and must complete it within the allotted time. No lockdown browser is required!

Final Exam: The final has the same format as the midterm exam. Although several parts of the Final will focus on Chapter 6, it will be comprehensive and include materials from Chapters 0-5.

Assignment Policy

All homework assignments are due online through Canvas. Assessments have been organized to follow a pattern and facilitate planning and organization. Students are responsible for checking due dates and completing assignments on time.

Late Work

Due dates are expected to be followed and are intended to allow you time to complete the course on time. As such, I generally do not accept late work. However, if exceptional circumstances occur, please reach out to me as soon as possible.

Instructor Responsibilities and Feedback

My goal in this course is to provide an environment conducive to your learning. I will be available during my office hours via email or Zoom. I welcome questions about any portion of the course and will be happy to clarify any issues if they come up. Most homework assignments are automatically graded. I make it a priority to grade exams quickly, but my experience suggests that it can take up to two weeks to get them back to you.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. The Census Date (Sept. 1) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)

- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy
