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This course aims to be not only relevant to your academic career, but also to help you begin developing writing skills and a writing process. You will find much of our course relevant to your daily life. This syllabus will give you an important overview of the course, the policies and procedures.

This course using *Reading and Writing about the Disciplines* aims to familiarize students with discourses in their future fields by teaching the skills of critical reading and thinking, analysis of the structure of a text, logical development of its standpoint, hypothesis, or argument; its use of evidence and language; and its purpose. The ultimate goal is to advance students' capability of critical reading, thinking, and writing about any source or text rather than for a specific upper- division course. At the end of the class, the students will be able to complete literature reviews for their research projects in their disciplines.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon completion, students will be able to:

- Recognize the conventions characteristic of writing in a discipline they wish to pursue as a major
- Review, analyze, and evaluate writing in the disciplines for a designated purpose
- Use the style of writing and documentation appropriate for the discipline
- Summarize, paraphrase, and synthesize texts accurately and effectively

- Select and incorporate material from sources professionally
- Present writing with a minimum of errors
- Write a literature review for a research project

The course is organized according to three learning units focused on skills that build towards these learning outcomes. Each module presents a variety of assignments that lead directly and indirectly to the major writing assignment for each learning unit. All work will be submitted through Canvas. You must submit papers as a doc, or docx file format. I cannot open other formats.

Assignments

Learning Unit #1: Summary

15% of final grade

Outcomes:

- To engage in the craft of paraphrasing through complete accurate restatements of other's ideas in the student's own words
- To become adept at close reading strategies and properly document a single source according to disciplinary requirements
- To identify claims and textual evidence, as well as distinguish between pertinent and extraneous information
- To generalize to define the nature of a matter of the gist of a text

Learning Unit #2: Comparative and Contrastive Rhetorical Analysis

25% of final grade

Outcomes:

- To practice writing literature reviews for the discipline
- To conduct a close rhetorical reading of more than one text
- To identify and analyze writing and rhetorical conventions in different disciplines
- To understand the difference between qualitative and quantitative research
- To cite source material correctly

Learning Unit #3: Rhetorical Review

40% of final grade

Outcomes

- To synthesize the arguments and information present in the articles under analysis
- To demonstrate logical reasoning, analytical writing, and documentation
- To compose a well-articulated justification for the project using a proposal

20% of final grade

Late Work

Each paper must be submitted on Canvas by the assigned due date. Papers that are submitted after the deadline will receive a grade of zero.

To be counted for a grade, your work has to be submitted in the appropriate drop box in Assignments in Canvas and be in Microsoft Word. There is a free copy of Microsoft O ice for all UT-Tyler students. If I cannot open your work, it is late. Please do not zip your files.

Extra Credit Policy

I do not give work for extra credit. I strongly encourage students worried about grades to discuss their concerns with me via e-mail. Addressing concerns early in the semester will allow you time to develop strategies to improve your grade.

Communication with Instructor

Finally, emails should be written in a somewhat formal style and tone—full sentences, reasonably correct grammar, and a succinct overview of the topic. So, less formal than the style you would use in a paper and more formal than the style you would use in a text to your friends.
