This recital is presented in partial fulfillment of the Bachelor of Music degree with concentration in instrumental performance.

PROGRAM NOTES

Yuhwa (Goddess of the Willow Trees), by Adolphus Hailstork (b. 1941) was composed in 2020 and premiered by Mimi Stillman in the same year. The inspiration is from Korean mythology and Yuhwa is the daughter of a River God who was tricked into marrying the Sun God. This piece for solo flute is in one movement and memorializes Hyorium Kim, a flutist from South Korea who teaches in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The willow tree is considered a source of healing in Korean folklore, and its depiction can be seen in this piece. This piece highlights the mix of an innocent melody and complex rhythms and range.

Dos Aires Candomberos, by Máximo Diego Pujol (b.1957) was composed in 2000, and memorializes Sául Martin, a fellow musician. Candombe is a style of music and dance that originated from African traditions and spread throughout Argentina, specifically Buenos Aires where Pujol is from. This piece gives both performers a chance to shine equally throughout both movements. Throughout the piece the guitar primarily has the candombe rhythm, but there are moments where the rhythm is shared between both voices. This piece contains a thrilling melody and some percussive guitar.

Itinerant, by Tōru Takemitsu (1930-1996) was composed in 1989 and memorializes Isamu Noguchi, a sculptor and friend of Takemitsu. This piece was performed by Paula Robinson at the Isamu Noguchi Museum in New York in 1989. Noguchi's work as a sculptor works are centered around exploration of landscape and perspective in a modernist, abstract style. Itinerant's music can be interpreted as the sculptures, and the silences are the landscape the fixtures exist within. Imagine wandering through this landscape, observing the sculptures from different angles as they try to make sense the of grief. Itinerant is in one movement and uses several extended techniques such as multiphonics, whistle tones, and pitch bends.

Ballade, Op. 288, by Carl Reinecke (1824-1910) was written in 1908 for flute and orchestra. Reinecke's goal was to keep the Classical era of music alive during the romantic era. This one movement piece, was the last work that Reinecke published and takes themes from his most famous work the "Undine" Sonata for flute and piano. The first, a slow melodic adagio which establishes the main theme that is passionate and emotional. The second, much faster section marked allegro features articulated sixteenth notes in A minor with slightly slower lyrical arpeggios in various major keys. The third section is a return to the adagio tempo with a short cadenza-like moment where the flute and piano trade off before returning to the central theme in D minor, but the piece ends in D Major.

Partita for traverso in A Minor BWV 1013, written by Johann Sebastian Bach (1865-1750) around the year 1717 is a collection of a four movement dance suite for solo flute. The "sarabande" is a slow dance in triple-meter that became popular during the same era and gained popularity in France. This movement contains big intervallic leaps and an emphasis on beat two to maintain the dance feeling. Sarabande includes baroque trills, terminations, and grace notes.

Flute Sonata, FP 164, by Francis Poulenc (1899-1963) was written in 1956 and memorializes Madame Sprague-Coolidge, an American pianist and patron of music. This piece was premiered at the Scarborough Festival in 1957 by flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal and Francis Poulenc. In 1959, Poulenc selected the sonata for a 60th birthday concert of his favorite compositions. This three movement piece starts with the Allegro Malincolico which is mournful, but contains moments of joy in the middle section. The second movement is titled Cantilena and is considered introspective rather than sorrowful. The third movement is the Presto Giocoso. It is lively and contains material from the first movement.
