MUSI 1116: Aural Skills I, Fall 2025

DESCRIPTION: MUSI 1116 is the first semester of a cumulative two-year Aural Skills sequence required of all music majors and minors. This course provides a basic study of melodic dictation, rhythm dictation and performance, singing of intervals, and singing of simple melodies from the 17th through the 19th centuries, corresponding with related courses in written music theory and keyboard lab.

PRE-REQUISITES: Music major or minor status only.

CO-REQUISITES: Concurrent enrollment in MUSI 1311 and MUSI 1111; otherwise, you will not be allowed to enroll in any of the second semester courses.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

1. *Music for Sight Singing*. Ottman, Robert W. and Nancy Rogers. 9th edition. Boston, et al: Prentice-Hall, Inc., 2014. ISBN-13: 978-0205760084, www.pearsonhighered.com "Rumor has it" that this edition can be found online for free. Earlier editions are not compatible, and the newest tenth edition is not worth buying a new book. Go to amazon.com or other sites (or even older students who already finished the course...) and buy a cheaper, used 9th edition book.
2. Cell phone that can record HD audio/video
3. A computer or smartphone with excellent internet/Wifi for exams and quizzes
4. A quality printer

OTHER MATERIALS: All students must bring manuscript paper (staff paper) to class *every day*. 10-stave paper is standard. Free staff paper can easily be found online at: http://www.musictheory.org.uk/manuscript_paper.php or many other places.

ATTENDANCE: All students should attend all classes; this creates habits that make you dependable and employable. You are counted as attending if you arrive no later than 8:15, have your materials with you, are participating, do not wear earbuds or headphones, and are not using your phone. To encourage good attendance habits early, I have an attendance policy. Excessive absences will affect the final grade. Students are allowed two absences without the final grade being affected. Each absence, starting with the third, will lower the semester average by two points each. The instructor retains the sole right to determine whether an absence is of an emergency nature that would not count towards the two allowed absences; emergencies are handled on a case-by-case basis. Student participation in UT Tyler-sponsored trips (absences associated with a UT Tyler course in which the student is enrolled) do not count towards the two allowed absences. Students who are habitually tardy will be counseled privately. In the case of chronic tardiness, the instructor reserves the right to reduce the final grade of those students who are habitually and significantly late. **HOWEVER**, if you are legitimately sick, **DO NOT COME TO CLASS**. For the well-being of both you and the class, you must go to the university clinic or a doctor. After an absence for illness, I must see a note stating you were seen by the university clinic or your own private physician, and cleared to return to class.

HYGIENE: As we still have Covid-19 among us, extra precautions are in place for the entire semester. I ask all students to hand sanitize upon entering the class; a hand sanitizing bottle/station is located at the door to the classroom. Even though the state of Texas forbids public universities to require a mask when indoors, I encourage everyone to wear a mask indoors and to receive the free Covid-19 vaccination.

STUDENT DRESS AND CONDUCT: Pajamas or sleep pants are prohibited as dress in this class. Any recording—video and/or audio—of any portion of lectures without express prior approval of instructor is strictly forbidden, and violators will be asked to drop the class and referred for disciplinary proceedings. Students must avoid wearing strong perfumes/after shave in rehearsal, as they can easily triggered allergies. Personal grooming and hygiene are important in group settings, because students must sit for a long time near each other. Students with noticeable body odor will be asked to leave class and charged with an absence. Do not use smartphones during class unless you are directed as a class to do so.

The two major exams have six parts: melodic, rhythm, and harmonic dictation, singing and rhythm performance, and singing of intervals. They will be administered both in class (dictation) and by appointment/phone recording (performance). The final exam will be a comprehensive two-hour exam during finals week. The final exam tentatively will take place at: **8:00am, Tuesday, December 10**

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completing MUSI 1116, students should be able to:

- sing melodies and intervals appropriate to entry-level, diatonic repertoire of the 18th and 19th centuries;
- take two-part dictation including ten diatonic chords and a few inversions, along with Roman Numeral analysis
- take rhythmic dictation in both simple and compound meter involving four rhythmic patterns and rests
- take melodic dictation from a bank of 32 melodies, in both major and minor keys up to two sharps and flats
- perform rhythms using the student's voice from a bank of rhythmic exercises
- audiate intervals both melodic and harmonic, including m2, M2, m3, and M3 up or down from a given note
