**Course Description**: A survey course covering elements of music and an overview of musical forms, historical periods and composers. Emphasis is placed on listening to representative repertoire.

**Course Learning Objectives:** The objective of *Music Appreciation* is for the student to gain an understanding of the development of Western music from the earliest known sources until the present day. The course includes the study of both sacred and secular music in all major genres. It places a strong emphasis on listening to and identifying various styles of music.

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be expected to:

- Apply basic musical terminology and develop listening skills for musical details relating to rhythm, melody, harmony, texture, and form.
- Become familiar with instrumental families and the basic production of sound on these instruments.
- Demonstrate a basic knowledge of significant composers and works for each period of Western music history.
- Understand the relationship between societal, cultural and musical developments throughout history.
- Identify the various genres of music and trace their development through the major historical periods.

#### **Required Materials:**

### **Class Format and Pacing:**

This course will be taught online using Canvas modules and Norton's Total Access (also accessed through Canvas). The course is asynchronous, but you will have regular due dates each week to keep you on track. It is to your benefit to work on assignments consistently so that you do not fall behind.

#### **Evaluation of Students:**

<u>Practice Tests</u>: There are six Practice Tests in Canvas for this course, covering the major periods of Western music history. Each practice test contains approximately 20-30 multiple-choice and true / false questions.

<u>Midterm and Final Exams</u> (using Canvas): The Midterm and Final Exams contain approximately 75 multiplechoice and true / false questions.

- For these major exams, make sure that you have a reliable internet connection. You might consider taking these exams on campus so that staff can help you if you encounter difficulties.
- All tests and exams are to be taken without any type of assistance. Complete them on your own without using any notes, websites, apps, etc. They must be your own, individual work.

<u>Short Essays on "What is Music?":</u> Two short essays examining your personal experience of music, the first reflecting on music before taking this course and the second showing how your perspective of music has changed after studying Music Appreciation during the semester.

<u>Concert Review Assignments</u>: Critically watch and evaluate *two* assigned concerts/performances, writing a report about each one. *Both reviews will be over specific performances on YouTube* (sorry, but you don't get to choose!). Each report should contain the following information:

- 1. Basic information about the concert (who, what, where/when), with a brief overview of all of the pieces on the program. Try to relate the performance to what you have learned this semester from our textbook, listening examples/quizzes, etc. Include information regarding instruments, voices, terminology, composers, musical forms, etc.
- 2. Pick two pieces on the program that particularly captured your attention, discussing your intellectual and emotional response to them and what you consider to be their value.

## Group Slide Project:

Using Google Slides, groups of 3-4 students will collaborate to create a "Slide Show" related to an assigned topic covered in Part 6 of the textbook ("Making Music Modern").

Discussions and InQuizitives will also be required. All are accessed through Canvas.

#### **Grading Procedures:**

2 Concert Reviews (via YouTube) = 10%
2 Short Essays = 10%
Online Discussion Forums (in Canvas) = 10%
InQuizitives (Total Access through Canvas) = 20%
Group Slide Project = 15%
Midterm Exam = 10%
Final Exam (comprehensive) = 10%
