Learning Objectives:

<u>Objective 1</u>: Students will demonstrate an understanding of the beliefs, principles, and practices of some major religions and cultures.

<u>Objective 2</u>: Students will demonstrate an understanding of the *meaning* of religion for individuals, cultures, and societies from both historical and contemporary perspectives. <u>Objective 3</u>: Students will understand and apply methods from various academic disciplines employed in religious studies.

Grade Assessment:

Discussion Boards (6 @ 30 points each): 180 points (45% or 7.5% each)

Quizzes (6 @ 20 points each): 120 points (30%, or 5% each)

Final Exam: 100 points (25%) Total: 400 points (100%)

Discussion Boards: Throughout the term, students are required to make a substantive contribution to a discussion board devoted to the week's material. I will provide a prompt for each forum as a starting point of the discussion. In addition to offering their own contribution, students are required to respond to at least one contribution made by another student. I will grade these contributions on the basis of the contribution they make to our discussion and their ability to make reference to material provided from the week (video/reading/Power Point).

Quizzes: There are six quizzes, which may include true/false, multiple choice, and/or short answer questions. Quizzes will be taken on Canvas, timed, and open book.

Final Exam: A final exam will be given through Canvas. It will consist of a short answer section, multiple choice, and true/false questions.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

 Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.

- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).

Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. Please contact the Enrollment Services Center if you have any questions.
