

# POLS 2306 – Texas Government

**Course Description:** Many Americans are only vaguely aware of what it is state governments do. Are they lower-tier entities tasked with carrying out the will of the federal government? Are they separate entities with their own sovereignty? What exactly are state governments, and where do they stand regarding the federal government of the United States? In this class we will explore the concept of the 10<sup>th</sup> Amendment and its bestowment of power to the state governments, the creation and evolution of the Texas government and Constitution, as well as the foundations and workings of the three branches of the Texas government. Furthermore, we will examine campaigns and elections, public opinion, political parties, interest groups, and the many local governments that exist in and around the Texas government.

## Time Management

In order to do well in this course, you **MUST** take responsibility for your work habits and ensure you do all the work. In other words, if you start to neglect your work, put things off, and fall behind, it will be extremely difficult to do well in this course. **Participation:** Part of doing well in this course is showing up and participating in the class lecture and discussion. Attendance will be taken periodically throughout the course in the form of quizzes or other activities.

**Lecture Quizzes** will consist of multiple-choice questions based on the material covered in class. Students will be given three attempts at these quizzes, and I will only keep the grade of the highest attempt scored. My suggestion is that students do the first attempt with no notes to test themselves on where they stand regarding the material. They can then use the second and third attempt with their notes to find the answers to questions they missed. This method should serve as a helpful test prep for the in-class exams and final. I will drop the lowest three lecture quizzes.

**Exams** will be in class and closed-book/notes. These exams will consist of multiple-choice and short-answer questions, which will be based heavily off of materials discussed in class. I will drop the lowest exam grade.

**Final Exam** will be held during the university's scheduled timeslot for this course. This exam will be cumulative, meaning it will cover all material discussed throughout this course.

Note: I understand that certain life events happen and that sometimes events are outside of your control. Such events may include, but are not limited to, power outages, illness, family priorities, etc. For that reason, I have dropped the three lowest lecture quizzes and the lowest exam grade. These drops are not "freebies" but are instead intended to cover such unrollable events. In other words, if you miss a posted quiz due to technical issues, that will count as one of your drops.
