<u>Course Description:</u> This course introduces students to the fundamental concepts of economics and provides a basic understanding of how economies function. The topics that are going to be covered include markets and price mechanisms; market failures and externalities; cost, revenue, profit maximization, and market structure; and organization of industry.

Course Objectives:

After completing this course, students will be able to

- 1. Describe basic economic concepts and principles.
- 2. Judge or interpret discussions, news, articles involving economic concepts/principles.

The course will consist of **three exams (20% each).** There will be both graded and ungraded forums on Canvas Discussions. The ungraded Q&A discussion forum will be open for the entire semester so that you may ask content questions, help each other, or form virtual study groups. There will also be two graded **discussion assignments**, which will constitute **10%** of your final grade (**5% each**). For these writing assignments, you need to find prompts that you will relate to the concepts covered in the course. The prompts could be a TED video talk, an article from a respected print or online publication, a political or economic cartoon, a movie, TV show, book, song, poem, or commercial. You may find the detailed structure and grading rubric for discussion assignments on Canvas. Due dates for discussion assignments are in the course schedule below. Instead of waiting for due dates, try to think about prompts you could use as you learn the concepts. I want you to look around and see that economics is everywhere.

LearnSmart Achieve (LSA) Assignments on McGraw-Hill Connect will make up **15%** of your final grade. There is no time limit for these assignments; you can work on them at your own pace. In addition, you will have a quiz for each module you complete (except for exam weeks). I will drop the lowest quiz score, and the rest will make up **15%** of your grade.

Your weighted average course score will be computed from your scores on the above components. I do not follow the traditional grade cutoffs. Your final grade will be assigned based on your score relative to the distribution of scores in the class. This allows me to assign letter grades without an absolute scale, and to adjust the percentages of the class receiving different letter grades. The percentage of students receiving any letter grade is not predetermined. It is possible for all students to get a C or above, and for the large majority to receive an A or a B. However, lower grades will be assigned to students who do not submit assignments regularly.

I will create weekly units under "Modules" and post the assignments you must complete each week. Even though quizzes and exams are from the MH Connect, you don't need to sign into their website. When you click on the assignments on Canvas, you automatically get redirected to their website without a need to sign in every time. Your grades also get uploaded to the Canvas grade book.

<u>Communication:</u> Email is my preferred method of contact. I make every effort to respond quickly to your emails. I check my emails several times a day during the week and less frequently on the weekend. When you send me an email, I generally respond within 24 hours during the week and 48 hours on the weekend (excluding holidays). Also note that I have regular Online office hours.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies: Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar (The Census Date in Fall 2020 is September 4).

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date (September 4th) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy: Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (September 4th).

Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. Please contact the Enrollment Services Center if you have any questions.

 - collaborating with or seeking aid from another student during a test or other assignment without authority;

 - substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for oneself to take a course, a test, or any course-related assignment;

- paying or offering money or other valuable thing to, or coercing another person to obtain an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program or information about an unadministered test, test key, home solution or computer program;
- falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other academic work offered for credit;

ii. "Plagiarism" includes, but is not limited to, the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another's work and the submission of it as one's own academic work offered for credit.

iii. "Collusion" includes, but is not limited to, the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing academic assignments offered for credit or collaboration with another person to commit a violation of any section of the rules on scholastic dishonesty.

iv. All written work that is submitted will be subject to review by plagiarism software.
