Course description: Study of the dynamic relationships between human cultures and their environments. This course will examine the strategies employed by humans to cope with challenges and take advantage of opportunities within their ecological environment.

Course Objectives:

- To examine and synthesize key theoretical concepts, thinkers, and practitioners on human-environment interactions.
- To develop required skills to critically read, analyze, and interpret scholarly works and case studies.
- Apply the learned theories to modern environmental problems and issues.
- To develop and improve critical thinking and writing skills about human-environment interactions.

Course format: This is a hybrid class where 1/3 of the class will be online. Even though we will not meet in class on Friday's you will still be held accountable for material assigned for Friday's class. Class lectures and discussions will be supplemented by the required text, current events, videos, demonstrations, and guest lectures. Lectures and readings will not necessarily cover the same ground. Indeed, they are intended to supplement each other rather than to completely overlap. All students must participate in the class discussions. I strongly recommend that you attend every lecture and carefully study the assigned readings. I encourage relevant questions and comments during the lecture. A question you have other students might also have, and thoughtful remarks will make the course more interesting for everyone, including myself.

Class Etiquette: I expect everyone in the classroom to be respectful of each other and treat everyone with dignity – we all bring to the class different opinions and experiences. Some of these might be dissimilar to your own. I expect comments to be positive and objective and not judgmental and rude.

Content Warning: Some of the readings and discussions in this class are emotional and controversial. I will do my best to provide a warning before we begin these discussions and readings. If you have any concerns about the content, please see me to discuss.

Grading: The course grade will be based on two exams (mid-term and final), group discussion participation, Friday online materials and assignments (that will be due on Monday), a research paper that will include a proposal and a presentation, as well as participation in discussions and attendance.

Exams: The mid-term and final exams will cover material from class including slides, discussions, presentations, guest lectures, readings, and videos. The midterm will cover material from the first part of the course; the final will cover material from the second part of the course including presentations by the class. Exams can include multiple choice, true/false, short answer questions, and essay questions dealing with major issues raised in the course. Exams are closed book and closed notes. **Any communication via an electronic device during an exam will be considered potential cheating.**

Discussions: Each student will be required to participate in four group discussions throughout the semester. See the syllabus for dates. To facilitate discussion, each person will be required to turn in at least 3 questions and/or comments covering all of the readings prior to class. Specific instructions will be posted on the class Canvas site. If you need help with this component, please ask me for further details. I will not accept late discussion questions and comments.

Friday Online Materials: I will post materials for you to review every Friday. You may work on these materials at your own pace. There will be 4 graded Friday assignments. You will be tested on all Friday materials during your midterm and final exam (Exam 2).

Case Study Research Paper (proposal, paper, and presentation): Each student will research, write, and present an 8–10-page research paper. The paper should examine a real-world example of human-environment interaction by analyzing the causes, consequences, and lessons learned from a specific case study of your choice. Detailed instructions will be posted on the class Canvas site. Presentations will occur towards the end of the semester.

Class Participation and Attendance: Students are expected to complete the readings for each class period and to participate in class discussions about the readings.

• Make-up Policy: Make-up tests will be given with a legitimate reason and in rare circumstances. Students should contact the instructor **prior** to the exam and not after if they will miss the exam. Make-up exams will not be given except when there are exceptional circumstances (be prepared to provide documentation of your circumstance, such as a doctor's note, police report, University-excused absence, *et cetera*).

Incomplete Grade Policy

If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a

grade only when **all** of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all coursework or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.

Grade Appeal Policy

Disputes regarding grades must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade by filing a Grade Appeal Form with the instructor who assigned the grade. A grade appeal should be used when the student thinks the final course grade awarded does not reflect the grades earned on assessments or follow the grading scale as documented in the syllabus. The student should provide the rationale for the grade appeal and attach supporting document about the grades earned. The form should be sent via email to the faculty member who assigned the grade. The faculty member reviews the rationale and supporting documentation and completes the instruction section of the form. The instructor should return the form to the student, even if a grade change is made at this level. If the student is not satisfied with the decision, the student may appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the department from which the grade was issued. In situations where there is an allegation of capricious grading, discrimination, or unlawful actions, appeals may go beyond the Chairperson to the Dean or the Dean's designee of the college from which the grade was issued, with that decision being final. The Grade Appeal form is found in the Registrar's Form Library.
