Course Catalog Description

This course provides a historical and philosophical overview of the American criminal justice system, including the nature, extent, and impact of crime; criminal law; and justice agencies and processes.

Course Rationale

This course provides you with an overview of the United States' criminal justice system. Students will learn the "who, what, when, where, why, and how" of the CJS and its actors. This course will give you the basic information you need to understand the complexities of our system and why it is the way it is today. Introduction to Criminal Justice will be the foundation upon which all of your other CRIJ classes will be built.

Technology Requirements

Attendance

You can't learn if you're not in class. You must attend and participate in the class to earn credit. I understand that life happens, but you need to be in class to learn the material we're covering. **Attendance will be taken each class session and will count as a major exam grade when determining your final course grade. Your attendance grade will be based on your attendance in class. Each day you miss counts as a zero and each day you're late to class will result in a 50% reduction in that day's attendance grade.**

Course Assignments

It is the student's responsibility to keep track of due dates. Please note that quizzes, assignments, and tests will be available for several days, so missing a due date for any given quizzes, assignments, or tests will translate into a 50% reduction in score. **There will be no extensions to complete the final exam -- if you're not here to take the final, you will receive a score of zero for the final. PLEASE don't "forget" that you have an in-class final exam!**

- **Anti-Plagiarism Certificate (5%):** You must complete the free, online anti-plagiarism course for which I will provide a link. Upon completion of the two required modules, you must upload a copy of your completion certificate to Canvas. This certificate is worth 5% of your grade and is required for successful completion of the course.
- **Quizzes (50%):** Reading the assigned chapters puts concepts into action. To help with retention and comprehension of the material, you will complete short quizzes each week. Quizzes will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions.
- **Activities (25%):** Your class consists of multiple units. You will complete various activities, including in-class discussion, over the course of the semester.
- **Exams (20%):** There are two exam grades: your attendance average and your final exam. The final will consist of true/false and multiple-choice questions taken from the material covered during the semester.

Activities and Learning Objectives

Crime Data

- Interpret crime trend data from official data sources.
- Construct tables, graphs, and other visual aids to explain crime trends.
- Design an infographic that summarizes crime data for your hometown.

A Day in the Life of a Cop

- Summarize normal duties for law enforcement officers in the United States.
- Appraise law enforcement duties to determine risk level.
- Design a poster that depicts the work life of a typical law enforcement officer.

Textbook Mind-map Project

- Read an assigned chapter from the textbook.
- Create a mind-map of a specified topic covered in that chapter. The mind-map will contain the main ideas, concepts, and information from the area(s) specified by the instructor.
- Submit the mind-map to the instructor.
