Catalogue description: Landscapes of the United States and Canada will be surveyed through a regional approach with emphasis on land use patterns, population dynamics, resources, and spatial interactions.

Course objective: The primary objective of this course is to introduce you to the urban, political, economic, physical, and cultural geographic issues of the United States and Canada. Although you will learn the locations of key places and landforms to become globally aware citizens, *this course's objective is not to promote or reward memorization*. Instead, you will be expected to be reflective, think critically, and write effectively on a variety of geographic topics. By the end of the course, you will be able to provide a geographical context for North American, to make spatial connections, and to understand the importance of geographical contexts in our everyday lives.

Course format: This is a hybrid class where 1/3 of the class will be online. Even though we will not meet in class on Friday's you will still be held accountable for material assigned for Friday's class. Class lectures and discussions will be supplemented by the required text, articles, current events, and videos. Lectures and readings will not necessarily cover the same ground. Indeed, they are intended to supplement each other rather than to completely overlap. I strongly recommend that you attend every lecture and carefully study the assigned readings. I encourage relevant questions and comments during the lecture. A question you have other students might also have, and thoughtful remarks will make the course more interesting for everyone, including myself.

Class Etiquette: I expect everyone in the classroom to be **respectful** of each other and treat everyone with dignity – we have discussions about issues and topics that might challenge your worldview. I expect comments to be positive and objective and not judgmental and rude.

Content Warning: Some of the readings and discussions in this class are emotional and controversial. I will do my best to provide a warning before we begin these discussions and readings. If you have any problems with the content, please see me to discuss.

Exams and grading: There will be three exams. Each exam is worth 20% for a total of 60%. Instructions for the exams will be posted to Canvas and discussed in class. The first exam will cover material from the first part of the course, the second exam will cover material from the second part of the course, and the third exam will cover material from the third part of the of the course. Exams will be multiple choice, true/false, and/or short answer. Additionally, there will be 5

Friday material assignments that you will bring to class the following Monday (**see schedule below and Canvas for details and due dates**). At times during the semester, you will be accountable for material assigned for our Friday's online class as well as the videos and readings that we will discuss but not be graded. These assignments/materials are meant to aid discussion in class as well as to familiarize yourself with the topics. All the assignments will be posted and submitted through Canvas. The class will discuss the results of the assignments on the day it was submitted. Finally, you will compose a picture journal based on key geographic terms. The picture journal will be due toward the end of the semester with the last couple of class periods used to present your photographs informally and discuss the process (**see schedule below and Canvas for details and dues dates**).

Final Exam Policy

Final examinations are administered as scheduled. Faculty members must maintain student final examination papers for a minimum of three months following the examination date.

Incomplete Grade Policy

If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a grade *only when **all** of the following conditions are met:* (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all coursework or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.

Grade Appeal Policy

Disputes regarding grades must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade by filing a Grade Appeal Form with the instructor who assigned the grade. A grade appeal should be used when the student thinks the final course grade awarded does not reflect the grades earned on assessments or follow the grading scale as documented in the syllabus. The student should provide the rationale for the grade appeal and attach supporting document about the grades earned. The form should be sent via email to the faculty member who assigned the grade. The faculty member reviews the rationale and supporting documentation and completes the instruction section of the form. The instructor should return the form to the student, even if a grade change is made at this level. If the student is not satisfied with the decision, the student may appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the department from which the grade was issued. In situations where there is an allegation of capricious grading, discrimination, or unlawful actions, appeals may go beyond the Chairperson to the Dean or the Dean's designee of the college from which the grade was issued, with that decision being final. NOTE: The Grade Appeal Form is different from the Application for Appeal form submitted to the Student Appeals Committee, which does not rule on grade disputes as described in this policy.
