Course Objectives:

The objective of this course is to provide the student with the basic analytical tools necessary to make value-enhancing financial decisions. Topics covered in the course include the analysis of financial statements, valuation of financial assets, estimation of cost of capital, capital budgeting decisions, capital structure decisions, and mergers and acquisitions.

Course requirements:

Students are expected to follow the lectures closely. Reviewing the end-of-chapter questions in addition to completing assignments is strongly recommended.

Required Text:

- The required textbook is Fundamentals of Corporate Finance, Author: Arthur Ross, Westerfield, and Jordan, **13th edition**.
- Students must have access to **McGraw-Hill Connect**, which contains easy access to ample exercises, step-by-step tutorials, sample tests, and valuable feedback for you to be successful in this course.

Recommended Text and References:

- Using either a financial calculator or Excel to solve the time value of money-related questions (e.g., security valuation and capital budgeting) is much easier than using formulas. The calculator used to solve class examples is the **Texas Instruments BA II Plus**. You are welcome to use another type/brand of financial calculator; however, it is your responsibility to figure out how to solve problems using it.
- For all in-person exams, you will not be able to access Excel. Excel can be used for assignments.

Exam:
