ABOUT THE GRADED COMPONENTS:

Quizzes:

There will be 8 chapter quizzes. Each of the chapter quizzes will consist of 10 multiple choice questions and will be worth a total of 10 points each. At the end of the term, I will drop the lowest quiz grade. To do well on the chapter quizzes, students should read the corresponding text book chapter, review power point slides, and watch the posted video lectures. I do not recommend taking the quizzes without reading the chapter, or trying to look up the answers during the quiz. While you are allowed to use your book, you will only have 10 minutes per quiz, which will not give you enough time to flip through the book for every question. Additionally, you must complete each quiz in one sitting – there is no way to "pause" the quiz and come back to it at a later time.

You will not be allowed to take the quizzes after the deadline has passed. You will be able to see your quiz grades after submission, including your answer and the correct answer. The quizzes will give you a feel for the kinds of questions you will see on the exam.

Total of 70 points.

SHRM assignments/webinars:

There will be two SHRM (Society for Human Resource Management) assignments in which you will be required to participate in a webinar and provide a written summary of the webinar and what changes you would implement in the workplace from and HR perspective based on what you learned. The assignment details are located out in Canvas.

Legal Cases:

There will be 2 legal cases that will need to be analyzed and questions completed appropriately during the course. Each case will be worth 25 points. Additional instructions are provided on Canvas.

Course Discussion Sessions:

You will have 2 discussion sessions to complete throughout the course. Each will be worth 25 points each and consist of an assignment in which you will be asked to complete a task, assignment, or watch a video and follow the instructions provided under the course assignments page in Canvas.

Practical Application Assignments:

There will be four assignments in which you will need to review an HR scenario and answer the questions provided. Each assignment will be worth 25 points. Additional instructions are provided on Canvas.

Exam:

There will be 2 parts to the final exam at the end of the course. One portion will include all chapters covered from the required text and will contain multiple choice, true/false, and matching questions. This portion of the exam will be open on Thursday, 8/8/19 at 8AM through Saturday, 8/10/19 at 11:59PM. You will have 120 minutes for part one the exam and it will consist of 85 multiple-choice, true/false, and/or matching questions. Thus, as with the quizzes, there is not enough time to flip through the book and find the answer to every question. Each question will be worth 2 points. Therefore, a total of 170 points are available on this portion of the final exam. To succeed on the exam, you need to have read the book, reviewed the power points, and spent time studying for the exam. You are NOT permitted to copy or screen capture any portion of the exam or discuss the exam with any other student. Any cheating will result in disciplinary action.

The second part of the exam will consist of a case study that will be worth 30 points. This portion of the exam will open on 8/7/19 and will be due on 8/9/19 at 11:59PM. Questions will need to be answered thoroughly and professionally, using the knowledge you have gained throughout the course.

You will complete several discussions with your peers in the class throughout the course. These discussions are to: 1) get you thinking about how the course material relates to you personally and specific current events and 2) provide student interaction. Each discussion will be worth 25 points.	
5. Practical Application Assignments:	140
You will have 4 HR related scenarios to read, analyze, and answer questions throughout the course. You will need to use the knowledge you have gained from the textbook, as well as the lecture videos, to complete each assignment. This is to allow you the opportunity to think like an HR professional and practically review and think through real world scenarios. Each assignment will be worth 35 points.	
5. Exam:	200
There will be 2 parts to the final exam at the end of the course. One portion will include all chapters covered from the required text and will contain multiple choice, true/false, and matching questions. The final will be comprehensive and will have questions from EACH chapter, even those in which quizzes were not required. Therefore, please prepare appropriately! This portion of the exam will be open on Thursday, 8/8/19 at 8AM through Saturday, 8/10/19 at 11:59PM. You will have 120 minutes for part one the exam and it will consist of 85 multiple-choice, true/false, and/or matching questions. Thus, as with the quizzes, there is not enough time to flip through the book and find the answer to every question. Each question will be worth 2 points. Therefore, a total of 170 are available on this portion of the final exam. To succeed on the exam, you need to have read the book, reviewed the power points, and spent time studying for the exam.
