COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to examine the physiological adjustments to a single bout of exercise (i.e., the transition from rest to exercise) and the physiological adaptations to repeated exercise (i.e., exercise training). Particular attention will be given to the neuromuscular, metabolic, cardiovascular, and respiratory responses to exercise.

Corequisite: KINE 3112 Physiology of Exercise Lab

COURSE MATERIALS

Textbook (recommended): Exercise Physiology: Theory and Application to Fitness and Performance (11th ed.) by Powers, Howley, & Quindry. You may use the previous edition (10th); however, the reading assignments listed in the course schedule pertain to the 11th edition.

- · Analyze physiological responses to exercise with respect to potential limitations in exercise performance
- Describe the health and performance implications of the physiological adaptations to exercise training

<u>Exams</u>: There will be 3 non-cumulative midterm exams during the semester. All exams will consist of multiplechoice, true-false, matching, short answer, and/or short essay questions over material from lectures, discussions, and assigned readings.

Optional Final Exam: If you miss an exam or are unhappy with one of your exam scores, you may take an optional cumulative final exam (given during finals week) to replace the missed/poor exam.

<u>Canvas Quizzes</u>: There will be several graded Check for Understanding quizzes. These quizzes are not proctored and there are *unlimited* attempts, with only the highest score counting. You may use your notes to complete these. Students are encouraged to take these until a perfect score is achieved. The Canvas quizzes will remain open until the day of the test.

Extra Credit Opportunity (optional): There will be <u>one opportunity per unit</u> for extra credit during the semester. It will be a written assignment and the nature of that assignment will vary by semester. You can earn up to 5 points on your exam grade with this opportunity. Please do not ask for additional opportunities.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions that students need to be aware of. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- · Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- · Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- · Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

STATE-MANDATED COURSE DROP POLICY

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university.
