Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to legal issues in public health and healthcare. Basic legal principles underlying the legal system, governmental regulation, development of legal rules, and how to interact effectively with the legal system as a public health practitioner will be explored. This course has two main purposes: first, to examine the legal context of the relationship between the individual and the community; and second, to understand public health regulation in the context of a market-driven system.

- 6. Argue for and against current health law reform implementation proposals (PLO Links 1.1,

Course Assessment / Methods of Evaluation:

Readings & Assignments: Textbook reading assignments are indicated in the course schedule. Additional assignments specific to each lecture may be posted. Please follow the instructions for assignment completion posted within each module. You are responsible for any additional materials provided, so please check with your instructor as needed.

Written Assignments: Five written deliverables will be assigned. Students are required to submit their assignment by Monday morning at 7:59am prior to the start of the next module/Week. A thorough response should address all components listed in the assignment. Successful leaders develop written communication skills which demonstrate the ability to communicate succinctly in writing.

Discussion Board Posts: Students are required to post a response to questions posted by the Instructor. Discussion Post submissions are due by Thursday night 11:59pm during the week assigned. Student replies to peer posts must be posted Monday by 7:59am CST prior to the start of the next module.

A Discussion Post student response to the Instructor question is approximately 300 words which includes a minimum of one outside resource. The resource cannot be from a newspaper, TV, or magazines. Your required textbook can be used but will not count as the external source. In addition to your required post, you must also read and respond to one other student post. Your response must be thoughtful and include content based on a reliable source. You may not only submit that you agree or disagree in your response. Resources must be properly cited and utilize APA format. Responding to both the Instructor question and to peer posts are required.

Mid-Term Exam. One mid-exam will be administered on-line. Exam format will be closed book and closed notes. Frames will be announced in the course module. The mid-term exam will be worth 20% of the final grade. The exam may be any combination of true/false, multiple choice, short-answer and essay questions. (PLO Links 2.1,4.1,3.6)

Final Project: Presentation and Writing Assignment.

- A presentation and writing assignment, worth 40% of the total grade, will also be required. The student shall analyze a current topic of interest within the healthcare and/or public health arena. Students will be provided a list of approved topics.
- An oral presentation (including PowerPoint slides appropriately formatted and sourced) will be required. The time frame length of presentation will be provided by the Instructors.
- An accompanying paper (to submit for grade) should be 5-7 pages with at least 5 additional references (in addition to textbook or course supplemental readings) and include all the elements from the associated assignment file/document. (PLO Links 1.1, 2.1, 2.2, 4.1, 5.1)
