Course Description:

This course is designed for the master's students who are not planning to pursue a nurse practitioner certification. Students will integrate concepts of advanced pathophysiology and advanced pharmacology to apply advanced health assessment principles and skills for comprehensive examination of clients. Focus will be on common deviations from normal. Populations across the lifespan will be included.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

Building upon basic health (physical & mental) assessment, pathophysiology, and pharmacology (3Ps) knowledge, this course focuses on the application and synthesis of this knowledge for clinical decision-making. Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Master and apply advanced concepts in health assessment including interviewing for holistic health history, advanced health examination, documentation strategies, and frameworks for diagnostic reasoning (mini-lectures).
- 2. Master and apply advanced concepts in pharmacology including pharmacodynamic and pharmacokinetic properties of drugs, pharmacogenetic concepts influencing drug therapy, legal prescription writing techniques for controlled substances, and advances in safe medication administration (mini-lectures).

- 3. Master and apply advanced concepts in pathophysiology including genetics and epigenetics, the influence of neurobiology on daily functioning and mental health, inflammation and its role in disease, and all major body systems. (mini-lectures).
- 4. Appraise current topics impacting pharmacologic treatment (novel treatments for cancer, antimicrobial resistance, opioid overuse and abuse, etc.).
- 5. Synthesize clinical diagnoses from information from multiple sources (patient history, health assessment, review of systems, lab reports, and medication history).
- 6. Integrate pathophysiologic concepts of disease in the assessment and treatment of patients across the life span (mini-lectures).
- 7. Integrate pharmacologic concepts as well as non-pharmacologic concepts into a patient-centered care plan (mini-lectures).
- 8. Collaborate with team members to develop an effective, evidence-based, safe, individualized plan of care for the patient that takes into consideration life circumstances, cultural, ethnic, and developmental variations.

Required Textbooks and Readings:

This course combines required content that is traditionally taught in three separate courses. Textbooks are needed to fully understand advanced content and to be successful in various activities in the course. Textbooks are expensive, so purchase only if you feel you will be using them in the future. Otherwise, renting is a good option.

CASE ANALYSIS

The purpose of this assignment is to apply 3Ps concepts in an unfolding case study on a particular disease topic for a particular patient. The questions within each document ask for detailed, graduate-level explanations of the 3Ps concepts.

GRAND ROUNDS PRESENTATION

The purpose of this assignment is to synthesize your knowledge of the 3Ps for one disease process that is affecting one particular patient. Each module, you will add sections to the 3Ps Write-Up and your patient's case. At the end of the semester, everyone will have a Grand Rounds Presentation that includes an entire Write-Up on the disease process and a story of your Case Patient.

MINI-LECTURES

The purpose of this assignment is to allow students to conduct in-depth research on an advanced 3Ps concept, teach the concept via a recorded Zoom session, and evaluate

audience's understanding by asking questions. Each student records a 5 to 7 minute Mini-Lecture on an assigned concept (see specific module for your assigned topic). Then, each student will view other students' Mini-Lectures and post an answer to a posted question.

Withdrawing from Class: Students, you are allowed to withdraw (drop) from this course through the University's Withdrawal Portal. Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in lieu of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all course work or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons prior to the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average for a student.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to complete all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has not been assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F or NC if the course was originally taken under the CR/NC grading basis.

Grade Appeal Policy: UT Tyler's Grade Appeal policy requires the completion of a Grade Appeal form for this action to take place. The grade appeal begins with the instructor of your course. If you do not agree with the decision of the instructor, you may then move your appeal to the department chair/school director for that course.
