Course Description: To facilitate ethical translation of current evidence into practice, this course provides an overview of theory and its relationship with research. Qualitative research designs and methods are explored.

- 2. Integrate ethical principles into planning and implementing research.
- 3. Discuss qualitative designs and methodologies.

Graded Course Requirements Information:

- Discussion Boards (2): Students will create initial posting and one reply to a peer based on discussion prompts
- Quizzes (3): Students will complete a 20-item multiple choice open-resource quizzes for the content covered in the week the quiz is due. Quizzes 1 and 2 will also include two essay questions
- Qualitative Critique (1): Students will learn to critically appraise and compare a qualitative article using provided checklists
- Responsible Conduct of Research Certificate (1): Students will complete CITI training to earn a certificate of completion
- Scholarly Papers (2): Students will write two scholarly papers based on provided prompts
- Please Note: Detailed information and instructions along with grading rubrics for all assignments will be provided
 in the Canvas course.

Non-Graded Course Requirements Information:
