Course Description: This course explores the reciprocity between health care policies and population health.

Prerequisites: Admission to any MSN program or enrolled in the PhD in Nursing program.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Examine causes of social, economical, political, and behavioral factors that affect health of populations.
- 2. Assess individual, organizational and community concerns, assets, resources and deficits utilizing a systems-thinking approach for population health.
- 3. Analyze policy issues that impact health care to support advocacy in the policy process at the system, local, regional, or national levels.

- 4. Identify critical stakeholders and key collaborative partnerships that influence the health care system to improve population health.
- 5. Evaluate health policies based on an ethical framework to advance population health.
- 6. Explain the planning, implementation, and evaluation of evidence-based population health initiatives.
- 7. Recommend strategies to safeguard population health during disasters and public health emergencies.

Graded Course Requirements Information:

- **Participation:** The participation grade will include course orientation Zoom recording attestation, student information, and graduate affirmation forms.
- <u>Discussion Boards:</u> Throughout the semester you will participate in group discussions to help you become familiar with concepts related to health policy and population health. Topics vary and are introduced within corresponding modules. Discussion board guidelines can be found in the start here module on Canvas. Grading criteria for assigned discussion board postings can be found within the modules for which they are assigned.
- **Population Health Quiz:** You will take 2 quizzes over population health content covered in the corresponding readings. The quizzes will be open book, but students are encouraged to read the assigned chapters before beginning the quiz.
- <u>Policy Brief Planning</u>: The Policy Brief Topic and an existing health policy (local, state, or federal law/hospital policy) related to the chosen topic will be submitted for approval prior to submission of the Policy Brief.
- <u>Policy Brief:</u> The purpose of the Policy Brief is to succinctly evaluate policy options regarding a specific health care delivery issue to advocate for intervention(s) at the systems level. This Policy Brief will include actionable recommendations to an *existing health policy* to positively impact healthcare. Recommendations will be informed by a literature review of the recently published (within the last 5 years) scholarly evidence available on the subject.

- Health Promotion Project: The Health Promotion for Populations Project has 2 parts. You will be divided into teams for this assignment. Teams will be determined in the first week of the course. Collaboration and participation of all team members will be key to successful completion. Our expectation is that this will be a great experience for all of you as you collaborate with your peers to learn more about population health.
 - Part 1: The first part of the assignment will help prepare you for the remaining parts of the team project as you establish team norms and expectations. After establishing group norms, you will begin to create a Power Point presentation based on an actual county that demonstrates the synergistic nature of health promotion in populations. In Part 1, you will assess the health of the county and population and select leading health indicators (LHI)s affecting your county that align with leading health disparities in Healthy People 2030.
 - Part 2: The second part of the assignment is based on the application of the Patient Protection and Affordable Health Care Reform Act, linking the Act to the selected population. Additionally, you will provide solutions and a key intervention targeted at impacting the priority health disparity that was identified in Part One.

Non-graded Practice Hours:

• Practice Hours (if applicable): If Fall 2025 marks your first enrollment in the UT Tyler SON master's program, to graduate you are required to complete a total of 750 practice hours if you are enrolled in an APRN program or 500 hours if enrolled in a non-APRN program. Here is the good news: we have a plan to help you accumulate these hours as you progress through the program. In this course, you will complete 10 practice hours, which will contribute towards the total requirement. You may not resubmit hours approved for this course in another course. We have created a list of ideas for you to choose from that will enhance your skills and competencies as a master's-prepared nurse! These practice hours are mandated by our accreditation agency, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).
