**Course Description:** Advanced qualitative research that integrates classical and developing philosophical traditions, methodology, design, analysis, and interpretation is studied.

The Great Debate: Teams debate whether descriptive or interpretive phenomenology is the optimal choice to explore a particular scenario.

Data Analysis: Coding transcript data and conceptualizing themes
