Course Description:

This course is designed to introduce the didactic information necessary to identify and treat critically ill and injured patients in preparation for transfer to a tertiary facility. Effective assessment and emergency stabilization skills, healthcare team dynamics, and safety are emphasized. Students will gain advanced skills and demonstrate critical thinking in applying evidence-based practice to care for clients with life-threatening disorders. Students will gain the skills needed to stabilize a critically ill or injured patient and prepare the patient for Critical Care Transportation.

NURS-4626 (Caring for the Acutely Ill)

Note: Successful completion of NURS-4626 is **REQUIRED PRIOR** to taking this course.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Students will develop entry level competency in procedural skills with emphasis on emergency and critical care nursing practice. Students will demonstrate mastery of the introductory concepts as they relate to critical care emergencies, stabilization, and preparation for critical care transport.
2. Professionalism. Students will have opportunities to engage with various interdisciplinary

emergency, critical care, and transport specialists through guest interviews.

3. Patient Centered Care. Students will recognize the critically ill and injured patient's preferences, values, and needs, and consider the uniqueness of the patient and their family and incorporate information into the plan of care.

4. Evidence Based Practice. Students will synthesize and apply evidence, along with clinical expertise and patient values, to improve the critically ill and injured patient's outcomes.

5. Quality Improvement. Students will show a systematic, data-guided approach to continuously improve outcomes and processes for critically ill and/or injured patients.

6. Teamwork and Collaboration. Students will develop an understanding of the vital function of interprofessional teams in the emergency/critical care arena and demonstrate effective communication, mutual respect, and shared decision-making to achieve quality patient care.

7. Leadership. Students will promote the practice of professional emergency/critical care nursing through leadership and advocacy.

8. Safety. Students will discuss appropriate measures to promote quality and a safe environment for patients, self, and others in the emergency and critical care transport environment.

9. This course focuses on the integration, translation, and application of established and evolving scientific knowledge of evidence-based critical care evaluation and management strategies as the basis for ethical clinical judgement, innovation, and diagnostic reasoning.

- 1) Exams will cover the reading content, and any PowerPoint/videos assigned for the modules. Quizzes are open-book, open-note format and will not be proctored. However, you are expected to complete each quiz independently.
- 2) Case Study Assignments will be composed of an unfolding case study format. A group of assigned students will work together to solve the unfolding case of a patient requiring resuscitation.
- 3) Participation. All lectures and guest interviews will be recorded. Students are expected to view them the week they are available. Interviews will have a short quiz associated with them. Participation in these items will be counted towards credit for participation.
