**Introduction to Pharmacy Practice Experience – 1**  
**Fall 2025**

**Course Description**

This course focuses on acquiring and practicing basic knowledge and skills required for upcoming pharmacy practice experiences, including an Immunization Certificate and participation in patient care events.

**Additional Course Information**

This course introduces students to the profession of pharmacy by providing an overview of skills and responsibilities for rotations. The didactic component of this course prepares students for introductory pharmacy practice experiences. Additionally, students will complete the APhA Pharmacy-Based Immunization Certificate Program. For the experiential education component of the course, students complete a series of experiences in various pharmacy practice settings. The structure of this course allows application and integration of knowledge and skills gained from the didactic curriculum while developing behaviors and attitudes needed as a pharmacist.

### Grading Policy & Grade Calculation

Grades will be determined based on evaluation of assignments, formative assessments (for learning), and summative assessments (for mastery). For all intents and purposes, final examinations are synonymous with summative assessments. Assessments may consist of, but are not limited to, multiple-choice, true/false, fill in the blank, short-answer, essay, and problem-based questions. They may also include a variety of formats beyond the traditional question-based written examination, as each CLO may require different methods to determine student achievement.

Assignments, formative, and summative assessments may be **cumulative**. Students are responsible for material presented during prior courses. The grading scale for all graded material is below. The final course grade will be assigned according to the calculated percentage and the percentages will not be rounded upward or downward. During the time the course is in progress, students who obtain less than 75% on any summative assessment or a total course grade of less than 75% during a particular semester will receive an academic alert from the course coordinator and the Office of Academic Affairs and be subject to weekly in-course remediation with the course instructor(s).

- Students are expected to be in attendance for each class period. Each unexcused absence will result in 10-point deduction from the final course grade.
- A deduction of 2 points from the final course grade will be deducted for each tardy (tardy is defined as any time past the start time of class).

Each dismissal from class for this purpose will result in an unexcused absence and result in a 10-point deduction in the final course grade.
