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Course Description

Studio art course that equips students with the ability to observe and draw the human form with accuracy and heightened sensitivity. The course progresses through a study of line, space, relationships, and value (in that order) as each applies to the human form. Some exercises are designed to limit the student in one way or another, in order to enhance their observation/minimize their reliance on generalization or their comfortable “drawing hand.” Drawing sessions feature live models and are composed of exercises, studies, and short and long poses. The culminating project is a large-scale, full-value figural drawing that (ideally) demonstrates technical skills of observation while also exhibiting creative and aesthetic decision making.

Outcomes

Course Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate the following learning outcomes:

- Describe the human figure using accurate and sensitive observation.
- Articulate the relationship between aesthetics and anatomy.
- Generate drawings that demonstrate descriptive, expressive, and conceptual approaches using varied materials and techniques within assigned parameters.
- Relate their drawings to historical and contemporary developments in the field.
- Analyze and critique drawings verbally and/or in writing.
- Demonstrate an appropriate level of professional practice, including safety, craft, and presentation.

Textbooks/Access Codes/Required Readings

"Drawing on the Right Side of the Brain" by Betty Edwards, **Not Required but highly recommended!** I pull many concepts and exercises from this book.

Required/Recommended Materials

Required materials **that you should buy:**

standard drawing pad (11 by 14 or bigger!)

hand-held pencil sharpener, vinyl/rubber/mechanical erasers, blending stumps/brushes/cloths, vine charcoal, binder clips.

Pad of Newsprint if you do not want to tear the paper from our community roll.

Charcoal is messy so consider bringing an apron or big t-shirt, etc., to cover up your clothes.

Other materials may be needed as the semester progresses.

Evaluation of Grades

Attendance is 20% of semester grade. After two excused absences the attendance grade goes down 5 points for each day missed. **HOWEVER**, if a student has an emergency arise, or strenuous experiences occur during the semester that involve death, sickness, mental health, etc., I will do everything I can to work with said student. **The key is to communicate with me and keep me informed.**

80% of semester grade is midterm and final portfolio submission.

4 days of coming in late count as an absence. That being said, **if you are running late, please still show up for class!** The class period is from 9 am to 2:55 pm! There is no excuse to skip the whole class due to, for example, oversleeping. Get there when you can and work. It is extremely difficult to make-up for lost workdays because we draw from live models.

Do not enter classroom if modeling is in session. Wait outside door for the first break to be let it into the classroom!

AGAIN, emergencies and illness issues can be worked out. Stay in contact.

Course Policies

Expected Classroom Etiquette for UT Tyler and for Life Drawing

If you attend this class on-campus then class etiquette dictates that you will:

- 1. Attend class each time the class meets. (Very important when we are working from LIFE.)**
- 2. Arrive to class EARLY to set up for life drawing.** Gives us more time with the model! Be on time for class and remain for the entire period. You are inconsiderate of your classmates if you arrive late and leave early. **If you are late to class, please wait by the door for the first break. Do not come in while modeling is in session.**
3. Refrain from talking while the professor is lecturing. Idle chattering and giggling are disruptive to the class and disrespectful to your professor and your classmates.
- 4. Do not speak to models while they are working.** Only instructor can speak to/ give directives to the model. Life-Drawing involves the observation and study of the nude human form. It is imperative to maintain a respectful, clinical, and professional atmosphere when working with nude models.
- 5. No music or headphones during Life Drawing.**
5. Be attentive and participate in class.

Facility Access & Studio Lab Safety and Mechanical Safety Training

Studio facility access is for enrolled students only. Students are required to use appropriate safety equipment (PPE) and practice safe operation procedures when using any hazardous equipment or materials. All students must successfully complete the lab safety training and mechanical safety training and quizzes on Canvas and complete an Art Safety Agreement through Canvas before after hours access to the complex is granted. Failure to adhere to the terms of the Art Safety Agreement will result in the loss studio facility access.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

For your safety, you must follow all safety requirements established by the department and university. It is required that you provide your own Personal Protective Equipment for use in studio areas. This equipment includes: dust mask with at least a N95 rating and attached filter, safety glasses, ear protection, gloves, close-toed shoes, and appropriate clothing. Failure to use this equipment while working may result in the loss of studio privileges.

Materials and Chemicals

Any additional materials or chemicals not included on the course material list must be approved by the faculty member in charge of the area where the chemical (material) will be used prior to the material/chemical being brought into the studio. Students are responsible for notifying the studio technician of any new materials/chemicals the day they are brought to the studio in order to insure that the appropriate Safety Data Sheet is on file and in the SDS binder.

Labels for any new, approved chemicals brought into the art studios must include the following information when they are transferred to a new container or if the original chemical label is damaged: Name of Chemical, Date chemical was opened, and any basic hazards associated with the chemical. Labels are located in each studio and must be filled out and adhered to the container immediately.
