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Course Description

A comparative and philosophical introduction to the religions of the world including but not limited to Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism

Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate their comprehension of the basic tenants of major world religions through examinations.
- Students will identify and analyze key persons and events in world religions through their development of a PowerPoint presentation.
- Students will assess the value of historical knowledge for world religions through a comprehensive final examination essay.

Course Policies

- This course will be offered online, which means students will not be required to come to a brick and mortar classroom on a weekly basis; nevertheless, regular “attendance” is required. Each student is required to visit the course Canvas site on a weekly basis to complete his/her assignments.
- **Late work will not be accepted**, except in the case of highly unusual and/or tragic circumstances. If a student is unable to turn in an assignment by its due date, he/she should consult with the professor as soon as possible to discuss special arrangements.

For this course, **AI is not permitted at all**. The work submitted by students in this course will be generated by themselves. This includes all process work, drafts, brainstorming artifacts, editing, and final products. This extends to group assignments where students must create collaboratively create the project. Any instance of the following constitutes a violation of UT Tyler’s Honor Code: a student has another person/entity do any portion of a graded assignment, which includes purchasing work from a company, hiring a person or company to complete an assignment or exam, using a previously submitted assignment and/or using AI tools (such as ChatGPT).

Assessment

1. Students will take two exams throughout the course of the semester, a mid-term and a final. For each exam, students will be asked to recall key events, persons, and ideas from their readings and class lectures. **YOU MAY NOT CONSULT YOUR NOTES WHILE TAKING THE EXAMS.** Both exams will consist of multiple choice, true false, and essay questions, and will be due no later than the following dates:

Posted November 4; Due November 6	Mid Term Examination
Posted November 30; Due December 2	Final Examination

2. Students will submit Reading Response Essays on a weekly basis. These 250-word essays should both summarize the reading assignment for that week and provide questions or reflections that arise from the reading. Students should work to balance their summary and reflection. Reading Response Essays are due no later than Friday at 5:00 p.m. (CST) of each week.
3. Toward the beginning of the semester, students will choose an important person or event from any world religion, which will serve as the basis for a 15-20 slide PowerPoint Presentation. Each slide should include detailed notes in the “note section” as well as a final slide showing the sources consulted for the project. Students should create the slide show as if they are preparing to introduce the topic to a college level class. Students should turn in these projects no later than **Friday, November 13.**
