Course Description: Many Americans are only vaguely aware of what it is state governments do. Are they lower-tier entities tasked with carrying out the will of the federal government? Are they separate entities with their own sovereignty? What exactly are state governments, and where do they stand regarding the federal government of the United States? In this class we will explore the concept of the 10th Amendment and its bestowment of power to the state governments, the creation and evolution of the Texas government and Constitution, as well as the foundations and workings of the three branches of the Texas government. Furthermore, we will examine campaigns and elections, public opinion, political parties, interest groups, and the many local governments that exist in and around the Texas government.

Time Management

Discussion Assignments: Students will be responsible for answering a question posed to the class and interact with other posts made by their colleagues. These will ask students to reflect on the course lecture and current events by providing a thoughtful response articulating their thoughts on why or what occurs in politics.

Reflective Writing Assignments: These will consist of short answer questions addressing the topic of the module. Students will answer these questions using the information and discussion points provided in the lecture videos. Full instructions for each assignment will be provided in Canvas. These may require Respondus LockDown Browser

Unit Exams: Students will only be able to complete unit exams in Respondus LockDown Browser. These will consist of several short answer questions which will come from the lecture materials posted. There will be four units, each consisting of three modules. As such, there will be four unit exams for this course. I will drop the lowest unit exam score.

I will round up to the nearest decimal point. For example, if you end with an 89.5 I will round that from a B to an A. There will be no exceptions to this grading policy.
