Course Overview

This course provides a comprehensive exploration of construction project management, guiding you through the complete project lifecycle—from initial owner feasibility studies to final project completion by contractors. By integrating essential concepts from **construction management** and **engineering economics**, this course offers both theoretical foundations and practical applications that will serve you throughout your career.

Construction projects represent some of the most complex engineering undertakings, requiring seamless integration of technical knowledge, financial analysis, and management skills. This course is designed around the principle that successful construction professionals must understand both the technical "how" and the economic "why" behind project decisions. You will learn to think like both an engineer and a project manager, developing the analytical skills to evaluate technical solutions within realistic economic constraints.

Rather than treating these as separate subjects, you will apply both skill sets simultaneously through realistic scenarios. For example, when evaluating equipment selection, you will calculate both the

operational efficiency (construction management) and the economic lifecycle costs (engineering economics). When developing project schedules, you will consider both technical sequencing requirements and cash flow implications.

This course emphasizes hands-on learning through:

- **Industry Case Studies:** Analysis of actual construction projects ranging from power plant projects to major infrastructure initiatives
- **Team-Based Projects:** Collaborative planning and analysis of construction projects that mirror real workplace dynamics
- **Guest Industry Expertise:** Professional practitioners will share current industry practices and emerging trends

A detailed schedule outlining topics, required readings, and assignment due dates is provided in the Calendar section of this syllabus. This schedule will serve as your roadmap throughout the semester, helping you stay organized and prepared for each class session.

Student Learning Outcomes

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

- **Analyze characteristics and challenges of the U.S. construction industry** including market structure, key players, material cost volatility, regulatory environment, and technology impacts.
- **Evaluate construction administration concepts** including project delivery systems, contracting, project control, dispute resolution, safety, and quality assurance by comparing delivery methods, analyzing contract types, implementing control systems, and developing management programs.
- **Calculate earthwork construction problems** involving volumes, material flow, machine power, and equipment cycle times by computing cut/fill volumes, analyzing material factors, determining haul routes, and optimizing equipment selection.
- **Develop building construction estimates** for time, labor, and materials by creating quantity takeoffs, applying costs and productivity rates, and incorporating indirect costs and contingencies.
- **Implement project scheduling and control methodologies** by constructing CPM networks, calculating critical paths and developing resource schedules.
- **Solve engineering economics problems** with compound interest and time value of money by calculating present/future worth, applying interest formulas, and evaluating cash flow patterns.
- **Apply economic equivalence methods** for engineering decision-making by comparing alternatives using present worth and rate of return analysis, and incorporating depreciation.

Course Structure

This course combines interactive lectures with hands-on group projects. Regular attendance is mandatory, and you are expected to actively participate in class discussions and contribute meaningfully to collaborative project work.

- Team project will give you an opportunity to apply project management concepts
- One midterm examination will be administered during regular class periods
- Final examination takes place during the designated finals week

Professional Practice

- You must attend **three professional practice meetings** to receive full credit for the professional practice portion of your grade in this course.

Homework Assignments

- Homework assignments cover all course content, including lectures, textbook readings, and class discussions
- Problems typically involve engineering economics calculations, construction estimating, and project analysis scenarios
- Assignments are due weekly and require 2-4 hours to complete
- Upload assignments to Canvas as a single file in PDF, Photo (e.g., JPG), or Word (e.g., docx)
- Show all work including formulas, calculations, and final answers clearly boxed
- Feel free to collaborate with your peers, but assignments must be submitted individually

Group Project

- A major course component where you'll apply project management and engineering economics concepts to plan a structure of your choice (residential building, small commercial facility, or infrastructure project)
- Deliverables include: cost estimate, project schedule, risk analysis, and economic viability
- Groups of 5-6 students will make an 8-10 minute presentation for project findings and analysis at the end of the semester
- Project guideline and structure options will be provided by the end of September
- Evaluation criteria: satisfying topical criteria in the project guideline (80%), teamwork (20%)
- Interim milestones include proposal submission and progress check-ins

Cardboard Canoe Competition (CENG4339-050)/ Popsicle Stick Bridge (CENG4339-051)

- Joining the competition of Ratliff Relays (RR) Competitions
- Presenting project poster and joining the competitions on October 24th (Tyler) and October 31st (Houston)
- Including submission of all the requirements for the competitions
- Evaluation criteria: satisfying topical criteria in the RR guideline (80%), teamwork (20%)

Exams

- Two exams will be given: Mid-term and Final Exam, comprehensively covering lectures, textbook material, assigned readings, and class discussions
- Format: Closed book - only writing instruments, erasers, and [NCEES-approved calculators](#) allowed
- Content distribution: engineering economics problems, construction management concepts and calculations
- Question types: Multiple choice, calculation problems, short answer/analysis
- Topics announced one week prior in class
- No practice exams provided - use textbook end-of-chapter problems for self-practice

Grading Policies

- Late HW submissions: While homework serves as a learning process rather than purely an evaluation tool, clear deadlines and policies are necessary to ensure fairness for all students and maintain academic structure.
 - 0-24 hours late: 25% deduction of earned grade
 - 24-48 hours late: 50% deduction of earned grade
 - More than 48 hours late: No credit
- Re-grade Requests: Grade inquiries must be addressed during office hours within **10 days** of grade posting (including holidays). Monitor your grades regularly on Canvas to track your progress throughout the semester.
- For all homework and exam solutions, you must present your work in a clear, organized format that includes:
 - Formulae used in the solution
 - Variable values with proper identification
 - Step-by-step intermediate calculations
 - Final answers with appropriate units
 - A box drawn around your final answer
- Failure to include any of these components will result in point deductions. Proper documentation of your solution process is essential for receiving full credit.
- There will be no makeup work or extra credit allowed/granted at the end or during the semester unless allowed/granted to everyone by the instructor.

Incomplete Grade Policy

If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a grade *only when **all** of the following conditions are met:* (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all coursework or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.

Grade Appeal Policy

Disputes regarding grades must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade by filing a Grade Appeal Form with the instructor who assigned the grade. A grade appeal should be used when the student thinks the final course grade awarded does not reflect the grades earned on assessments or follow the grading scale as documented in the syllabus. The student should provide

the rationale for the grade appeal and attach supporting document about the grades earned. The form should be sent via email to the faculty member who assigned the grade. The faculty member reviews the rationale and supporting documentation and completes the instruction section of the form. The instructor should return the form to the student, even if a grade change is made at this level. If the student is not satisfied with the decision, the student may appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the department from which the grade was issued. In situations where there is an allegation of capricious grading, discrimination, or unlawful actions, appeals may go beyond the Chairperson to the Dean or the Dean's designee of the college from which the grade was issued, with that decision being final.
