

MUAP xx37: Applied Trumpet Spring 2019

Instructor: Dr. Jeremy McBain

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Office Hours: Mon/Wed @ 1pm and Tues/Thurs @ 10am (other times available by appointment; subject to change)

Course description: Students develop technical proficiency on their instrument, become familiar with the standard repertory, and develop their musicianship. Students meet with the instructor for a 55-minute lesson each week.

Required Materials

- 1) Trumpet and Mouthpiece
- 2) Metronome and Tuner
- 3) Practice Journal
- 4) Methods (Clarke, Arban, Schlossberg, Irons), Etudes, Excerpts, Routine Packet, and Solos

Expectations:

- 1) The student is expected to be on time, warmed-up, and prepared for his/her scheduled lesson time and studio class. In case of emergency or illness, contact the instructor as soon as possible.
- 2) Lesson notes and recorded practice run-throughs will be turned in prior to each weekly lesson via upload to Canvas.
- 3) Methods, etudes, and solos, which are assigned, will be obtained in a timely manner.
- 4) The student will make every attempt to hear all brass recitals (student, faculty, guest artists) in addition to other performances as part of their MUSI 1000 coursework.
- 5) Students are responsible for communicating clearly with accompanists and scheduling coaching sessions with applied instructor

Performance Requirements

- 1) Perform on at least one Student Recital each semester
- 2) Perform in studio class as assigned each semester, which meets Tuesday, 5-6 pm
- 3) Perform a jury at the end of each semester. Juries are a performance opportunity that should be treated equally with a recital performance. Students are responsible for contracting and payment of an accompanist for the jury.
- 4) Perform on additional studio engagements such as Evening of Brass, April 2nd, 2019 and Guest Master Class Monday, Mar. 5, 2019

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at <http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar>. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware.

These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance.  - collaborating with or seeking aid from another student during a test or other assignment without authority;
 - discussing the contents of an examination with another student who will take the examination;
 - divulging the contents of an examination, for the purpose of preserving questions for use by another, when the instructors has designated that the examination is not to be removed from the examination room or not to be returned or to be kept by the student;
 - substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for oneself to take a course, a test, or any course-related assignment;
 - paying or offering money or other valuable thing to, or coercing another person to obtain an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program or information about an unadministered test, test key, home solution or computer program;
 - falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other academic work offered for credit;

- taking, keeping, misplacing, or damaging the property of The University of Texas at Tyler, or of another, if the student knows or reasonably should know that an unfair academic advantage would be gained by such conduct; and
- misrepresenting facts, including providing false grades or resumes, for the purpose of obtaining an academic or financial benefit or injuring another student academically or financially.
- “Plagiarism” includes, but is not limited to, the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another’s work and the submission of it as one’s own academic work offered for credit.
- “Collusion” includes, but is not limited to, the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing academic assignments offered for credit or collaboration with another person to commit a violation of any section of the rules on scholastic dishonesty.
- All written work that is submitted will be subject to review by plagiarism software.
