Course description:

A survey course covering elements of music and an overview of musical forms, historical periods and composers. Emphasis is placed on listening to representative repertoire.

Learning Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Understand and evaluate music in an oral and written format.
2. Identify aurally and visually standard instruments and each instrument family of the orchestra.
3. Possess a theoretical, cultural and historical background to listen to music from the middle ages to present time intelligently.
4. Interact intelligently, in a variety of styles and mediums, in a society that is surrounded with music.
5. Possess listening skills to help them evaluate the quality of various styles of performances.
6. Identify characteristics of melody, rhythm, harmony, texture and form.

Methods for Evaluating Outcomes: Students will be evaluated through written concert papers and exams.

Methods of Instruction: Meetings will largely consist of lectures, presentations, and group participation activities. Instructional methods will also include audio and video examples and attending live performances.

*** Attendance/Promptness/Demeanor Policy:** Your attendance is expected at each lecture. Excused absences require written documentation and are granted by the instructor. Absences due to illness, emergency, or participation in an official University activity are excused. Please give your written documentation to the instructor no later than one week after the absence. Bring a copy that you can leave with the instructor. Each student will be allowed three absences without penalty, with the exception of exams, see below. **After the 3rd absence, each class missed will reduce your final grade by two points.** The excused absence must be documentable and verifiable in order to be considered for an exemption from point reductions, which is the sole decision of the instructor.

Cell phone use, food, outside work, and leaving the room are not allowed during class. Tablets and laptops are allowed at the discretion of the instructor for note taking, however they may be revoked if off-task or disruptive to the class. Students who are disruptive will be asked to leave and will receive an absence for the day. Students who are repeatedly tardy or leave class early will have a meeting with the instructor and receive attendance deductions accordingly. Violation of any of the above policies will negatively impact the attendance grade.

**** Due Dates and Absences Policy:** All assignments are due on the days indicated, at the start of class. Late assignments will not be accepted, and no credit will be given for papers or exams not turned in due to *unexcused* absences. At the instructor's discretion, absences may be considered *excused* only for **legitimate, documented reasons** (serious illness, family emergency, etc.). In cases of *excused absences*, any outstanding assignments are due at the following class period. Missed exams **must be made up within one week of the absence**. In all cases, students who must miss class should inform the instructor as soon as possible prior to the absence.

Students will attend two UT Tyler concerts and write an essay about each concert. The paper should be 400-500 words typed (NO handwritten accepted) and criteria for the paper will be posted on Canvas early in the semester. Due dates for the essays are posted below in the course schedule.

Exams: will consist of multiple choice and matching questions. A review will be given in class which outlines the exam. Students are responsible to provide their own green scantron sheet and #2 pencil.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at <http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar>. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade

replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware.

These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a “W” grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. - i. “Cheating” includes, but is not limited to:
 - copying from another student’s test paper;

- using, during a test, materials not authorized by the person giving the test;
 - failure to comply with instructions given by the person administering the test;
 - possession during a test of materials which are not authorized by the person giving the test, such as class notes or specifically designed “crib notes”. The presence of textbooks constitutes a violation if they have been specifically prohibited by the person administering the test;
 - using, buying, stealing, transporting, or soliciting in whole or part the contents of an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program;
 - [ollaborating with or seeking aid from another student during a test or other assignment without authority;
 - discussing the contents of an examination with another student who will take the examination;
 - divulging the contents of an examination, for the purpose of preserving questions for use by another, when the instructors has designated that the examination is not to be removed from the examination room or not to be returned or to be kept by the student;
 - substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for oneself to take a course, a test, or any course-related assignment;
 - paying or offering money or other valuable thing to, or coercing another person to obtain an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program or information about an unadministered test, test key, home solution or computer program;
 - falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other academic work offered for credit;
 - taking, keeping, misplacing, or damaging the property of The University of Texas at Tyler, or of another, if the student knows or reasonably should know that an unfair academic advantage would be gained by such conduct; and
 - misrepresenting facts, including providing false grades or resumes, for the purpose of obtaining an academic or financial benefit or injuring another student academically or financially.
- ii. “Plagiarism” includes, but is not limited to, the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another’s work and the submission of it as one’s own academic work offered for credit.
- iii. “Collusion” includes, but is not limited to, the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing academic assignments offered for credit or collaboration with another person to commit a violation of any section of the rules on scholastic dishonesty.
- iv. All written work that is submitted will be subject to review by plagiarism software.
