## MUSI 2116: Aural Skills III, Fall 2021

**DESCRIPTION:** MUSI 2116 is the third semester of a cumulative two-year Aural Skills sequence required of all music majors. This course provides a dictation and sight-singing element to the harmonic, rhythmic/metric, and contrapuntal practices of music from the 17th through the 19th centuries, corresponding with related courses in written music theory and keyboard lab. The dictation and sight-singing components will continue to develop micro-listening skills.

**PRE-REQUISITES:** MUSI 1117 or equivalent, with grade of C or better.

**CO-REQUISITES:** not required, but I STRONGLY ADVISE concurrent enrollment in MUSI 2311 and MUSI 2111. Students will not be allowed to enroll in Music Theory 4, Aural Skills 4, or Keyboard 4 without completing all co-requisites.

Earlier editions are not compatible, and the newest tenth edition is not worth buying a new book. Go to amazon.com or other sites and buy a cheaper, used 9th edition book.

**OTHER MATERIALS:** All students must bring manuscript staff paper to class *every day*. Any dictation assignment submitted on paper other than manuscript staff paper will be given a grade of zero. **ATTENDANCE:** Excessive absences will affect the final grade. Students are allowed **two** absences without the final grade being affected. Each absence, starting with the third, will lower the semester average by three points. The instructor retains the sole right to determine whether an absence is of an emergency nature that would not count towards the three allowed absences. Emergencies are handled on a case-by-case basis. Student participation in UT-Tyler-sponsored trips (absences associated with a UT Tyler course in which the student is enrolled) do not count towards the two allowed absences. Vacations, trips not associated with a UT Tyler class, airplane schedules, etc. are not reasons to miss class, and work missed for these reasons will be given a grade of zero. Furthermore, if a student has six or more absences, **regardless of the reason**, s/he must drop the course or receive a grade no higher than a D. Students who are habitually tardy will first be counseled privately, but if necessary the instructor reserves the right to reduce the final grade of those students who are habitually and significantly late. **HOWEVER**, if you are sick, **DO NOT COME TO CLASS**. You must go to the university clinic or a doctor. After an absence for illness, I will not allow you to come back to class unless I see a note stating you were seen by the university clinic or your own private physician, and cleared to return to class.

**Hygiene:** As we are currently in a Covid-19 pandemic, extra precautions are in place for the entire semester. I require all students to hand sanitize upon entering the class; a hand sanitizing bottle/station is located at the door to the classroom. Regardless of the governor's ill-advised proclamation forbidding public universities to require a mask when indoors, I encourage everyone to wear a mask indoors and to receive the free Covid-19 vaccination. All students must sit and remain six feet away from the instructor at all times.

**Student Dress and Conduct:** Hats or caps of any kind, pajamas, or sleep pants are prohibited as dress in this class. Any recording--video and/or audio--of any portion of lectures without express prior approval of instructor is strictly forbidden, and violators will be asked to drop the class and referred for disciplinary proceedings. Students must avoid wearing strong perfumes/after shave in rehearsal, as they can easily triggered allergies. Personal grooming and hygiene are important in group settings, because students must sit for a long time near each other. Students with noticeable body odor will be asked to leave class and charged with an absence.

## Written Exams

The two major exams have five parts: melodic, rhythm, and harmonic dictation, singing performance, and rhythm performance. They will be administered both in class (dictation) and by appointment (performance). The final exam will be a comprehensive two-hour exam during finals week. The final exam tentatively will take place at:

## Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completing MUSI 2116, students should be able to:

- sing melodies appropriate to medium-level repertoire of the 18th and 18th centuries;
- take two-part dictation including all diatonic chords and appropriate inversions, along with Roman Numeral analysis
- take rhythmic dictation in both simple and compound meter involving six rhythmic patterns and rests
- take melodic dictation from a bank of 32 melodies, in both major and minor keys up to three sharps and flats
- perform rhythms using the voice from a bank of rhythmic exercises
- audiate intervals both melodic and harmonic from a minor second to a perfect fifth

## **Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies**

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. (For Fall, the Census Date is September 3.) Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at <http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar>. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract. The Census Date (Sept. 3rd) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- ☑ Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- ☑ Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- ☑ Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- ☑ Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- ☑ Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

## **State-Mandated Course Drop Policy**

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).

Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. Please contact the Enrollment Services Center if you have any questions.

  - \*possession during a test of materials which are not authorized by the person giving the test, such as class notes or specifically designed "crib notes". The presence of textbooks constitutes a violation if they have been specifically prohibited by the person administering the test;
  - \*using, buying, stealing, transporting, or soliciting in whole or part the contents of an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program;
  - \*collaborating with or seeking aid from another student during a test or other assignment without authority;
  - \*discussing the contents of an examination with another student who will take the examination;
  - \*divulging the contents of an examination, for the purpose of preserving questions for use by another, when the instructor has designated that the examination is not to be removed from the examination room or not to be returned or to be kept by the student;
  - \*substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for oneself to take a course, a test, or any course-related assignment;
  - \*paying or offering money or other valuable thing to, or coercing another person to obtain an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program or information about an unadministered test, test key, homework solution or computer program;
  - \*falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other academic work offered for credit;
  - \*taking, keeping, misplacing, or damaging the property of The University of Texas at Tyler, or of another, if the student knows or reasonably should know that an unfair academic advantage would be gained by such conduct; and
  - \*misrepresenting facts, including providing false grades or resumes, for the purpose of obtaining an academic or financial benefit or injuring another student academically or financially.
- ii. "Plagiarism" includes, but is not limited to, the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another's work and the submission of it as one's own academic work offered for credit.
