This course takes a panoramic view of religion and politics, focusing on several historical periods and world regions. More than an emphasis on theologies or beliefs, we will examine religious organizations and how they interact with state structures. This course explores the role religion plays in politics and its implication for civil life. As such, the more appropriate title for the course might be "Church & State in World History," with "church" being a generic simplifying term that includes synagogue, mosque, temple, etc.

Our goal is to understand how various religious institutions, actors and values affect political behavior, and, conversely, how the political actors and institutions affect religious practice. This course will also take a "rational choice" perspective to the study of religion, religious institutions, politics, and governments. The emphasis will be on how humans interact with the incentive structures in their environment.

Readings and lectures will be drawn largely from the Buddhist and Christian experience, though we will touch upon Animism and Islam at points in the class. The intention of the professor is to provide you with a basic familiarity with the literature and, more importantly, the intellectual tools to pursue your own studies of the subject matter.

This class will meet face-to-face on Tuesdays from 12:30 to 1:50p and online on Thursdays. Thursday's class will be video viewing.

God in America Reflection Notes: There will be <u>six</u> reflection worksheets due throughout the semester. These are meant to help students think carefully and critically about the readings and

video. Each worksheet will consist of two or three guided questions. Answers to each question should be approximately 400 words and should be written in a single paragraph.

Religion and Politics Analytical Paper: During the semester, students will write an analytical, fiveto-seven-page paper, double-spaced, 12-point font, type-written essay with 1-inch margins. In this paper, the student will be asked to explore and discuss aspects of the readings, videos, and class discussions. This paper must have and support a thesis.

Examinations: There will two examinations in this course. The midterm and the final examinations will be drawn from required readings, videos, and in class discussions. You must be in class to answer questions about our in-class discussions.
